ROTHESAY LIST.

Subject of a Spirited Discussion in the House.

GOVERNMENT BILL PROVIDING FOR NEW LIST FINALLY AGREED TO.

Dr. Pugsley Warmly Resents the Insinuations

THAT THE FRAUD HAD HIS OR THE GOVERNMENT'S COGNIZANCE.

In the legislature Thursday afternoon, Hon. Mr. Tweedie laid on the table the education report.

On the order of the day supply being called Mr. Hazen said that owing to the absence of Messrs. Flemming and Melanson, who wished to speak on the budget debate, he should ask the provincial secretary to allow the debate to stand over.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that however desirous the government might be to expedite public business they recognized the reasonableness of Mr. Hazen's request and would not press supply, but would allow the motion to stand.

Mr. Osman gave the following notice of motion: Resolved that it is the opinion of the house that the province of New Brunswick will be materially benefited in commercial as well as in the present dominion tariff law be so amended that the preferential clause now applying to British goods imported into Canada shall apply only when such imports are made through a Canadian port.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, committed the bill relating to the Rothersey election list, and in doing so, said, he thought that an examination of the bill would convince the committee that the government had taken the most desirable and indeed the only proper way of making up the list.

Mr. Hazen understood that the objection of the attorney general against legalizing the list now in the hands of the county clerk was that this would not be done because he did not know where the genuine list is.

Mr. Hazen—"It does not require to be sworn to."

Hon. Mr. Pugsley—"After this we intend that it shall be sworn to."

Proceeding, Dr. Pugsley said the leader of the opposition proposes to declare that this paper shall be regarded as the genuine list, although it is so declared to be, not on the affidavit of the revisors, but of a third party.

Mr. Hazen was surprised at the lofty tone of indignation adopted by the attorney general. Surely it was a most improper thing to say that there must be no criticism of this bill.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said he had no objection to any reasonable criticism of the bill but when he found a bill as well guarded as this one was criticized from sources where they had expected support, he felt he had a right to be indignant.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley referred to the unfairness of the attack made on himself. The Halifax Herald had published a statement that Mr. Gilbert was his brother in law, as if he and Mr. Gilbert had been concerned in a plot against the electors of Kings.

PEACE AT HAND.

War Office Expects Its Realization Within Three Weeks.

KITCHENER AND BOTHA CONFERRING ON TERMS OF BOER SURRENDER.

Enemy has been Granted an Armistice of Seven Days

(Special to Daily Herald.) London, March 8.—The war office stated today that peace in South Africa would be a realization within three weeks.

Pretoria, March 8.—Lord Kitchener and Botha had a long conference on G in Hill this morning. Botha was alone and Kitchener was accompanied by his secretary.

Lorenzo Marques, March 8.—Lord Kitchener has granted General Botha seven days armistice to enable him to confer with other Boer generals.

London, Mar. 8.—Lord Kitchener reports that the Boers failed in their determined attack upon Lichtenburg.

The British losses beside two officers already reported, are fourteen men killed, and twenty wounded. The Boer general Colliers was killed.

NUMIDIAN SAFE.

Big Troopship with Strathcoas Reached Halifax To-day.

(Special to Daily Herald.) Halifax, March 8.—The steamship Numidian with the Strathcoas on board, dropped anchor at 8.30 and was boarded by many persons.

Capt. Main said the ship had experienced continued heavy head winds on the passage but nothing exceptional occurred.

An officer who was asked how often the regiment had been under fire, thought the question was a difficult one to answer. He said that in one month they had been 26 days subject to attacks or sniping, the enemy using more or less powder every day.
