

PREACHES TOLERANCE

Rev. Father Carney Says
Life is Too ShortFOR NARROW BIGOTRY TO HAVE
A PLACE IN IT.New Pastor of St. Dunstan's
Opening Sermon to His
People.CHURCH PROPERTY ENTIRELY
CLEAR OF DEBT—BISHOP
CASEY'S LIBERALITY.

Rev. Father Carney assumed charge of the Fredericton parish of the Roman Catholic church yesterday. At both masses he read a letter from His Lordship Bishop Casey in which the latter assigned him to the charge of the congregation of St. Dunstan's.

At ten o'clock the reverend gentleman addressed the congregation. He said that twelve years ago in answer to the call of the late lamented Bishop Sweeney, he had assumed charge of his first parish at Debec, Carleton County. He had since lived happily and contented among the people in the parish. He had loved it, and it was his home. He would have been contented to remain there, and not leave it. Again he had heard a call, this time it was the voice of a new bishop, who was like the late bishop the successor of the divinely appointed apostles. He obeyed the call and came to St. Dunstan's parish. It was the duty of the priest, said Father Carney to win souls for God. He would use his best efforts to do his duty, and asked the co-operation of the congregation, both by their prayers in his behalf, and by their works.

Father Carney congratulated the congregation on their fine church property, and on the splendid improvements made in the last few years under their late esteemed pastor, Bishop Casey, and said it was only right to state that St. Dunstan's was at present clear of all debt. An amount had been due from the congregation to their late pastor, but the latter out of his affection, and to show his gratitude for the friendly relations which had always existed between the congregation and himself, had cancelled all this.

The new pastor referred to the pleasant relations which had characterized all his dealings with the people at Debec who were not of his own denomination and of the religious toleration which existed there. He said life was too short for narrow intolerance, and what the world wanted was more Christian charity among all classes and creeds. Father Carney concluded by asking the prayers of the congregation for the success of his work among them.

MURDER OR ACCIDENT?

Mangled Remains of an I. C. R. Watchman Found on the Track.

Campbellton, N. B., May 18.—The mangled remains of Randolph McBeath, one of the I. C. R. watchmen at the Morrosey Rock tunnel, lie at the railway station here. The young man was a son of William G. McBeath of Tidehead, one of the best known and highly respected citizens of Restigouche county. Coroner Doherty and a jury viewed the remains this morning, and an inquest will be held on Monday. The story of the death as told around town today is as follows:

The deceased was in town last night and went to Metapedia on the Quebec express, and from there started to walk to Morrissey Rock. Between Metapedia and Flatlands he was struck by the west bound freight and killed. The train was stopped and his remains laid to one side and the matter reported at Metapedia station. A special at Metapedia coming down picked up the remains and brought them here.

Town Marshal Duncan states that there is a strong suspicion prevailing that McBeath met with foul play. A number of citizens are urging that the crown should be represented at the inquest.
