Harvey Station, May 20.—Mrs. Wm. Bell, who was so badly burned by her clothing accidentally catching fire, nearly three weeks ago, died of her injuries at her home in Tweedside on Sunday morning. From the first very little hope of her recovery was entertained as her injuries were of a terrible nature. She was a daughter of Mr. Wm. Messer, Sr., of Tweedside, and leaves a husband and three small children.

UNPLEASANT EXPERIENCE.

Young Man Violently Assaulted on His Way from Fredericton.

A few evenings ago as Robert Lister, of Frog Lake, parish of Manners Sutton, was returning from a trip to Fredericton he had a rather unpleasant experience. Just after he had entered the Frog Lake road his horse was stopped by what seem-

ed to be some obstruction on the road. While he was preparing to alight to find out what it was he was struck from behind and knocked senseless from his carriage. When he recovered consciousness he found his horse all right and his watch and money untouched. The night was very dark and he saw or heard no one. He was considerably shaken up by the blow but not very seriously hurt. Mr Lister is a young man of good character and why such an attack as this should have been made on him is a mystery and such a cowardly attack as this ought to be investigated and the guilty parties punished if caught.

A WOODSTOCK ROBBERY.

Victor Skipped Out With a Large Sum of Money and Diamond Ring.

Woodstock, N. B., May 19.—Some time ago young Walter Gould and his wife, of Boston, came to visit Michael Murphy and his wife of Woodstock. Mr. Murphy is electrician in Connell Bros.' station. Mrs. Gould is a relative of Mrs. Murphy and was married in February last. The young man seemed to be all right, and was hospitably treated by Mr. Murphy. He did not put in an appearance at the house on Friday night, and on Saturday morning his wife found a letter in the post office box, which coolly announced that he had taken the train for Quebec en route to England. This was bad enough, but on investigation it was found that he had taken with him \$300 of Mr. Murphy's earnings, a beautiful and valuable engagement ring of his wife's and other jewelry. As soon as he found that he had been robbed Mr. Murphy informed Chief of Police Harvey, who telegraphed to the police departments in St. John, Houlton and Bangor.

INCREASED INDEMNITY.

Debate on the House of Commons To-day.

LAURIER AND BORDEN SPOKE IN FAVOR OF RESOLUTION.

Minister of Railways Opposed to It

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, May 20.—When the House adjourned at one o'clock to-day a debate was in progress on the resolution by the Premier to increase the sessional indemnity of members to \$1,500.

Laurier and Borden both supported it. The Premier pointed out that when the present indemnity was fixed the sessions only lasted two months. Now the House often sat four months.

Borden argued that the increased indemnity would induce men high in mercantile life of the country to enter the house.

Blair opposed the resolution. The Premier announced that the Crow's Nest Southern Railway bill would likely be withdrawn.

The bill to incorporate the Canadian Nurses' Association was killed in committee.
