

## BAD FOR LIPTON.

### Columbia Won Second Heat for America Cup.

### SHAMROCK LED OVER THE FIRST STRETCH,

### But Was Overhauled and Beaten by Yankee Boat.

### RACE SAILED UNDER MOST FAVORABLE WEATHER CONDITIONS.

### ANOTHER RACE TOMORROW.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

New York, October 3, 8 a. m.—A steady northwest wind has been blowing since early morning and is now 24 miles an hour at Sandy Hook.

Betting on the race is reported dull. The largest wagers yesterday were H. M. Pearsall who bet \$1,000 to \$800 that the Columbia would win the series. F. P. Brooks bet \$600 to \$500 that the Columbia would win today. George Wegver bet \$500 even that the Columbia would win the next two races and W. R. Coster made a smaller bet of \$500.

8.30 a. m.—Sandy Hook reports the wind steady at 22 miles from the northwest.

10.05 a. m.—Both racers are near the lightship still in tow, and the wind holds steady and strong.

10.53 a. m.—Both yachts are at starting line, and manouevring for position.

10.56 a. m.—The committee has set the signal for a triangular course, first leg east, half south; second leg, south west, half south; third leg, north, north west. The warning signal was fired at 10.55.

11.01 a. m.—They are off, Shamrock to windward.

11.05, a. m.—The Shamrock crossed first, the unofficial time being: Shamrock, 11.00.07; Columbia, 11.01.45.

11.11, a. m.—The Columbia is staggering along in a stiff wind. The Shamrock seems to stand up better and is ahead.

11.20 a. m.—The official time of the start, Shamrock, 11.00.13; Columbia, 11.01.47.

11.25 a. m.—The yachts have covered nearly half the distance to the first mark. Both are holding a fine wind and Columbia seems to be slightly decreasing the Shamrock's lead.

11.39 a. m.—The yachts are nearing the first mark, going at a terrific pace, Shamrock well ahead.

11.49 a. m.—They are very close to the mark, the Shamrock still well ahead and will turn first.

11.51 a. m.—The Shamrock turned first mark at 11.50.55.

11.53 a. m.—Columbia turned first mark at 11.52.20.

11.55—Both boats are now on the starboard tack heading for the second mark.

11.59—Columbia seems to have gained slightly. The wind holds true.

12.07—During the last fifteen minutes of sailing the Columbia seems to have held her own without gaining. The wind is increasing but the sea is smooth and they are fast reaching toward the second mark.

12.15—The official time of turning the first mark as given by the Marconi wireless telegraphy is: Shamrock 11.51.06; Columbia 11.52.17.

12.30—The boats are rapidly nearing the second mark. Both heeled about the same angle and there has been apparently no change in their relative positions.

12.38—Boats are now two miles from second mark, wind increasing, Columbia is apparently gaining slightly.

12.45—Shamrock turned the second mark.

12.46, a. m.—The Columbia the turned second mark.

12.53, p. m.—The unofficial time of turning the second mark as given by the Marconi wireless telegraphy was Shamrock, 12.45.17; Columbia, 12.46.39.

12.58 p. m.—Shamrock is to windward and still ahead. The wind holds strong.

1.04 p. m.—The boats are very close to each other. Shamrock to windward apparently blanketing Columbia.

Shamrock is footing very fast, but Columbia seems to out point her.

1.17 p. m.—Columbia is apparently ahead.

1.28, p. m.—The Columbia is now well ahead.

1.38 p. m.—Columbia now seems to be nearly half mile ahead and still to windward. She will win, barring accidents.

1.48 p. m.—Columbia continues to gain.

1.59 p. m.—The boats should finish within the next ten minutes.

2 p. m.—Both yachts have gone about

on the starboard tack and are heading for the finish line, Columbia leading by a quarter of a mile.

Columbia wins.  
2.15 p. m.—Columbia crossed at 2.15 unofficial; Shamrock crossed at 2.16.20 unofficial.

2.18 p. m.—Columbia won by 337.7 corrected time, unofficial.

Official time as received by Marconi wireless telegraph, Columbia 2.15.05; Shamrock 2.16.23.

2.35 p. m.—The official time for second turn, Shamrock 12.45.51, Columbia 12.46.39.

The official time of turning the first mark, Shamrock 11.51.10; Columbia 11.52.22.

2.33, p. m.—The committee has decided to race again tomorrow.

Ended in a Tie—Dr. Sterling's Delicate Position.

While Mr. Hinchey and himself were both Liberals and Mr. Merrill was a Conservative he would not let that influence him in the least. He gave other fair reasons why he should declare Mr. Merrill a councillor for the ensuing term.

Dr. Sterling's fair decision is commended by all who appreciate the awkward position in which he was placed, both candidates being particular friends of his.

### BEAR ISLAND.

Sept. 30.—The farmers of this section are about through with their harvesting, the oat and buckwheat is not up to the average owing to the dry weather.

Quite a number of the men who went to Aroostook to dig potatoes are returning. They report crop fair, and wages from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per day. 27 car loads per day are being shipped from that section, and sell at \$1.25 per bbl.

### Duties Greater Than Value.

On certain kinds of spirits imported into the Dominion the duties are greater than the invoice value. Thus the value of amyl alcohol or fusel oil imported last year was \$284 and the duties collected \$573.64. The value of ethyl alcohol was \$232, and the duties collected \$783.48. The value of absinthe imported was \$2,696, and the duties \$4,007.
