Conservative Party All
Split Up.

OVER THE PROPOSAL OF SMALL
FACTION TO NOMINATE A
CANDIDATE.

Resolution to Call a Convention
Rescinded by the Executive.

ANOTHER CARRIE NATION HAS
APPEARED.

(Fredericton Gleaner.)

At a meeting of the executive of the York County Liberal-Conservative Association, held at the office of the secretary Thursday evening, a resolution was adopted rescinding the resolution passed at the last meeting of the executive authorizing the acting president to call a convention of the party to meet in this city on the 3rd of July next. At a former meeting of the executive a majority of the members present were personally opposed to nominating a candidate to contest the county in the approaching bye-election. The claim, however, was advanced by some members of the minority that the people were anxious for a contest. The majority, who were in a position to be well informed, did not admit the claim, but said they would support a resolution authorizing the President to call a convention; and such a resolution was passed. The day following a telephone message was received from Coun. Scott of the Barony declining to accept the office of President or to call a convention. Another meeting was thereupon called for Wednesday afternoon to further consider the situation, but not a member of the committee attended, and at the personal request of some friends of Dr. McLeod another meeting was summoned for Thursday evening at 7.30 o'clock. It was 8.30 before the meeting was called to order. The resolution of the first meeting was rescinded. A supporter of Dr. McLeod then proposed a resolution calling a convention of the party for July 3rd to elect a new president, a new secretary and a new executive, and to transact other important party business. Objection was taken that the proposed resolution was an unwarranted reflection on the executive of the York County Conservative Association, the majority of whom had spent much of their means and much of their time during the last 15 or 20 years in promoting the interests of the Conservative party in this county, and with success. The proposed motion could not find a seconder, and the resolution passed just previously rescinding the call of convention stood as the wish and will of the majority, notwithstanding that a friend and supporter of Dr. McLeod threatened to smash the Conservative party in York in from one to five years if his resolution were not seconded and adopted. The decision of the executive is quite in keeping with the will of the majority of the Conservative party in York. It is also in keeping with the view of the Conservative representatives from New Brunswick in the House of Commons at Ottawa. It is also, we believe, quite in accord with the will and wish of the leaders of the Conservative party in Parliament.
