

C P R STRIKE

Indications That a Settlement Will be Reached Next Week.

LOCOMOTIVE BROTHERHOOD AND OTHER SOCIETIES

Using Their Good Offices to Bring About a Reconciliation.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, June 22.—There is good ground for the belief that the trackmen's strike on the C. P. R., will be settled by Thursday of next week.

Whether the men will succeed in wresting from the company the concessions asked for, is of course a matter of conjecture.

It is more probable though that a compromise will be effected. This settlement will be brought about, it is asserted, from a trustworthy source by the good offices of the Locomotive Engineers and kindren Railway Brotherhoods, who have called a meeting for tomorrow afternoon for the purpose of discussing the situation.

A C P R fireman today said it was not their object to embarrass or antagonize the Company, although it was natural that they should have at least a passive or natural sympathy with the trackmen.

Tomorrow's gathering of boys, said he, is solely for the purpose of appointing a joint committee who will call upon the management of the C. P. R., and urge that a settlement of the trouble be made as speedily as possible in the interest of safety.

It is further learned that the committee referred to above will call upon Mr. Shaughnessy on Monday.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Synopsis of Thursday's and Friday's Sessions.

At Friday afternoon's session of the Methodist conference at Marysville, a memorial service was held re the decease of the Rev John Prince. Several brethren spoke of the good record made by the deceased and of the valuable service rendered the church during a ministry of over fifty years.

The second report from the statistical committee gave the amount raised for circuit purposes as \$69,373; for ministerial support, \$40,946, and for other purposes, \$23,422. Total for all purposes, \$133,741.

The next meeting of the annual conference will be held in Sackville, a very cordial invitation having been extended by the official board of that circuit.

At 7.30 Friday evening conference met for open session to consider educational matters.

Rev. Dr. Paisley presented a report which upon motion was adopted.

Rev Geo Steel, ex-president of Conference, reported his pleasure of visiting Mt. Allison Institutions during past year.

James M Palmer, M A, principal of Mt Allison Academy then spoke of his work. The attendance at the academy has been the largest for years.

Rev Dr Stewart, Dean of Theology spoke of the work of the theological department in which every sign of advancement is evident.

Rev Dr Williams of St James church, Montreal, spoke at some length with words stirring and well worth considering on interest of spiritual education.

The seventh session of the 18th annual conference opened at 9 a. m. Friday, Rev A. B. Thomas led in prayer. A hymn was sung and Rev J. C. Berrie addressed conference from the theme "our spiritual strength."

Upon motion, Rev Dr Williams of St James Methodist church, Montreal was heard. He addressed conference at some length. His report concerning the debt so great a year ago upon that church was very gratifying that the church was not creeping but bounding out of debt. Upon motion this conference pledged itself to stand by Dr Williamson in his heroic and grand effort to clear that church of debt.

The following is the resolution moved by Rev R W Weddall and second by Rev Dr Paisley, resolved that the conference having heard with pleasure the clear and strong statement made by Rev Dr Williams of the affairs of the St James Methodist church, of Montreal, that we will at an early hour take such steps as are necessary to secure the meeting of our share of the payment requisite to relieve the said church of its indebtedness.

Dr E Evans addressed the meeting upon missionary matters, refuting some

statements made by some parties who have undertaken to criticise the manner in which the General Board conducts the distribution of its funds. His remarks were cheered as he explained all questions so clearly.
