The first ripe wild strawberries of the season were brought into the market this morning and sold readily at \$1.00 per half pail. Home grown cultivated strawberries will be on the market next week.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Several Matters Considered at a Meeting
of the Committee.

Mayor Crocket, and Alds Rossborough, Everett and McNally, Chief Engineer Lipset and Capt N J Smith were present at the meeting of the fire committee yesterday afternoon. The matter of procuring an extension ladder was considered, and the Chief Engineer stated that one forty feet in height could be purchased for \$180. Some members of the committee thought that a fifty foot ladder should be purchased, and the chief engineer was instructed to correspond with other houses and obtain information as to the cost.

The chief engineer urged the committee to take some action in regard to the erection of an additional hose station in the back part of the town. This matter has already been considered by the committee, and a majority of the members do not favor the idea, but seem to think that it would be better policy to purchase a span of horses and have them kept in readiness at the Central Hose Station to haul the hose cart in case of an alarm. Chairman Rossborough is strongly of the opinion that horses are a necessity in connection with our fire department and he has already gone so far as to procure an estimate of the cost, and probably before long he will take further action. The chief engineer's remarks were closely listened to, but numbers of the committee had nothing to say regarding the matter.

BASE BALL NOTES.

Fredericton Men Making Creditable
Records Abroad.

The Resolutes and Standards played two games at Halifax yesterday, before audiences numbering 700 in the morning and 2,000 in the afternoon. The Resolutes won 10 to 6 in the morning, batting Friars of St John for ten runs, but in the afternoon the Standards did their opponents up 1 to 0. Finnermore of Fredericton played short for the Resolutes, and in the morning game made 3 runs, 2 base hits, 2 put outs and 1 error. The Recorder's report of the game gives Finnermore credit for making a difficult catch. Ned Embree was backstop for the Standards and had no errors. In the morning he got 2 base hits, 7 put outs and 1 assist. The suspension of both Tibbitts and Howe of the Lewistons has been removed, and both played with the team yesterday, at Portland, the Lewistons being defeated 14 to 7, Tibbitts played centre and had 1 hit and no errors, Howe made 2 runs and 4 assists and 3 errors.

The Bankers team of this city went to Marysville to play the team of that town this afternoon. The game was called at 4 o'clock.

HARRIS LOCATED

Has Been in Massachusetts For Several
Weeks.

The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Norman Harris, the well known shoe maker of this city, has been solved, and his friends will be glad to know that he is alive and well. A letter was received yesterday by Ernest Harris of the Barker House, from his mother now in Calais, stating that she was in receipt of a letter from her husband, and that he was at present in Massachusetts and had employment there. Harris left Fredericton the latter part of May, going to St. John, and afterwards disappearing rather mysteriously while a guest at the Ottawa hotel, it was thought that perhaps he might have lost his life by falling into the ship.

S. S. Convention.

A meeting of the York County S. S. Executive was held in the president's office last evening, when arrangements were completed for the County Convention. After communicating with Mr Leverett Estabrooks and Miss Ross, of Prince William, it was decided to hold the convention in the Baptist church there on the 24th and 25th of July next. An interesting programme is being prepared by a special committee composed of Mr Sampson, the President, Mrs M O Risteon, Secretary, and Mr A S McFarlane, Secretary-Treasurer.

A Couple of Misstatements.
