NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Items of Interest Condensed from Herald Exchanges.

An embassy from the Sultan of Morocco arrived at London to congratulate King Edward on his accession to the throne. The members brought many costly presents for the King.

John McNally, employed in a livery stable at Biddeford, Me., tried to break into a grocery store Friday night, but after smashing the glass in one of the windows his courage failed him, and he went to the police station and gave himself up. Various tools were found in his pockets.

Owing to imperfect addresses and other causes 2,867,842 letters, postcards, book packets, newspapers and parcels could not be delivered by the British Post Office Department last year. In 288,667 cases the senders had neglected to put on any address at all. The value of the contents of the undelivered letters was £725,613.

There have been one thousand cases of smallpox in Ontario since the present outbreak in December. This statement was made by a smallpox expert who has covered most of the infected districts. The Provincial Board of Health has received notice of at least seven hundred cases all told, and three hundred more cases would be a conservative estimate, the expert says, of the people who have had the disease in remote portions of the Province.

A man from Wheeling, Va., was pronounced dead by the doctors, and a coroner's jury found that he came to his death by heart disease. When the undertaker was about to embalm him, he suddenly revived and ran away. He was pursued and captured, taken before a police magistrate and fined for being dead—drunk. The police judge declined to accept the explanation that it was a case of dead restored to life, or the theory of a trance. He held that the man had been dallying with spirits, but had not been any nearer the spiritual world than the undertaker's shop.

the land. They joined men and women in life, buried them in death, were general peacemakers to the community at large and judges of dog fight. Their position in western communities was unique, and the stories that have been told about them have been innumerable. One of the most peculiar characters to be found in Washington, however, was one Reed, J. P., who ruled over the town of Belknap, Mont., since deceased in the early 70s.

"He performed at Belknap, in the winter of 1878, a marriage ceremony that is classic in western annals. He made the bride swear that she would support the constitution of the United States and the organized acts of the territory of Montana; that she would be ever loving, faithful and true, and would be ever willing to defend—with her life, if necessary—the honor of her God, her country and her flag.

"The bridegroom was compelled to swear that he would split the wood, carry the water, shovel the snow, build the fire, and under any and all circumstances try to be a perfect gentleman. Instead of returning her devotion with slurs and scowls he would repay it with kisses and kind words. If he was shy of kisses he was to call on the justice of the peace, who was long on kisses, but short on girls. Reed wound up this unique ceremony by making the couple recite the Lord's prayer in unison. And the ceremony ended with a crack of a revolver and a pop of beer corks."
