A SLIM GATHERING.

Dr. McLeod's call for a meeting of the Tory party at the Y. M. C. A. parlors was not responded to with that alacrity, and enthusiasm and crush that might be expected of a party that believed itself in a position to win a victory at the polls. Outside of the half dozen persons who promoted the petition against Mr. Gibson, there does not seem to have been anybody of political consequence present, and it is hinted that some of those present were there to protest against opposing Mr. Gibson's re-election. There are some people ever anxious for an election, men like the Doctor and Mr. Pitts who sustain none of the financial burdens of a contest, but expect to reap the rewards, but we are satisfied that the sober second sense of the Conservative party is strongly opposed to further persecution of Mr. Gibson. They fought the last election with all the ability and weapons at their command, they were fairly beaten, and they can see no wisdom in embroiling this constituency in another contest, merely to satisfy the spleen of a few disappointed individuals. The men who are supposed to direct the Conservative party in York were conspicuous by their absence at the gathering called in the name of the party, but entirely unauthorized by its leaders, and thus they showed that their feeling is against the attempt of a few unimportant individuals to run the show to suit themselves.

The Conservative party has nothing to gain from a renewal of the election contest that was settled in November last. The party is in opposition, the leaders have manfully accepted defeat and have set about building up their party in preparation for the next general contest. There is nothing to be gained from a party standpoint by their contesting the bye elections, especially where vacancies have been made by the election courts. The man who has carried a constituency in the general election, and who is followed into the courts by persecution, has the sympathy of a large number of fair minded people, men of independent judgment, as well as those of the opposite party who believe in a fair fight, and seldom if ever in such cases does the unelected candidate fail to secure reelection by an increased majority.

This is the position of Mr. Gibson, and we are satisfied that the Conservative leaders, have, in failing to countenance the efforts being made to bring forward opposition, correctly interpreted the general feeling of their party.

NOT A PARTY NEWSPAPER.

The Sun when it approaches the consideration of political questions utilizes the truth with penurious frugality. The Herald has made no attempt to read the Montreal Witness out of the Liberal party, but we did say that the Witness is not considered a Liberal party newspaper, a statement with which the Witness itself will no doubt agree. That paper professes and exercises political independence, attacking Liberals as well as Conservatives. It supported Dr. McLeod in the last election in York, and it is commending him now. We leave it to the judgment of the Sun even, whether the Witness in pursuing that course shows any indication of its Liberalism. Dr. McLeod was the nominee of the Tory party convention, and every possible effort was made by that party to secure his election. The Witness aided in the work, thus endeavoring to bring about the defeat of the government. The Liberalism of Mr. Tarte, Mr. Gibson and the editor of the Herald, whom

the Sun is good enough to name, has nothing to do with the position of the Witness, but possibly any of the gentlemen mentioned will be considered quite as loyal members of the Liberal party, as Dr. Stockton for instance, whom the Sun supported as one of the Tory candidates in St. John. The Sun will also be able to recall the fact that Mr. Foster, who eventually became one of the Tory leaders, and continued in that position until his defeat by the Minister of Railways, not so many years ago was a Liberal and voted for a Liberal candidate in this constituency, and that Mr. R. L. Borden, the present head of the Tory party, was a Liberal up to about ten years ago. When the Sun is willing to associate with and acknowledge as leaders, such eminent ex-Liberals as the gentlemen we have named, it surely can have no objection to others who have seen fit to withdraw their allegiance from the Tory party and unite themselves with the Liberals. We may add, although the fact is not important, that up to the time of his association with Tory newspapers, the editor of the Sun himself was a Liberal, so that he is not in a position to reflect on others who have changed their party allegiance.

RESPONSIBILITY ASSUMED.

Fredericton today experienced the annual peaceful invasion of little folk who come over from England looking for homes. It is to be hoped that those who have adopted the youngsters will feel the full responsibility of their act, and prove themselves worthy of their self-imposed trust. In too many cases children from the orphan homes have been ill treated, and forced out into the world with their moral condition not the best. Some too have turned out badly, but in the great majority of cases we believe the experiment of adoption has resulted mutually pleasant and profitable. The little ones are of an age easily moulded, and their future largely depends upon the treatment they receive in their new homes. They are parentless, in a strange land, among strange scenes, and should be surrounded by gentle yet firm influences, that they may grow up to be useful and respected citizens.

Edward Bok in the Ladies' Home Journal for June, writes that there is too great a lack in the practical education of our girls. Such a practical phase of a woman's life as the realization and meeting of honest obligations never enters into a girl's studies at school, college, or, in the vast majority of cases, even at home. We go on and let our girls study useless ologies and isms, and accumulate a vast amount of undigested and unintelligible information which never, even for a single moment, will be of the slightest use to them in their lives. But of the practical things, yes, the fundamental principles which must govern their lives, they are taught either nothing or little.

Mr. Pitts will no doubt be much relieved in learning that the Fredericton-Meductic mail contract has been awarded after competition by tender, to the lowest bidder, and that there was no political influence exerted by anybody to effect a different result. Mr. Pitts has lost a lot of rest over the matter, and it will be comforting and composing to his shattered health that the affair has been settled in a business like and satisfactory manner.

The forgers of the Rotheay list have not even been ordered to leave the country in ten days, and there is no evidence that they injured their brain by smoking cigarettees.—Sun. And the parties who stole Queen's county's representation from the Liberals are still at large, some of them exercising important political functions, within the Tory party, while others are enjoying the fruits of public office.

The last issue of the Smashers' Mail edited by Mrs. Carrie Nation, the saloon smasher, calls one man a "sorrel top liar" and another "a ponderous mass of humanity in the guise of a man." The motto at the head of the first page is "Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men."

Hon. Edward Blake is not the only Canadian who has caught the ear of the august parliament at Westminster. Mr. Gilbert Parker, the eminent Canadian novelist, who represents Gravesend in the House of Commons, made his maiden speech in that body recently and was given a very hearty reception and an attentive hearing.

The St. John school trustees have refused to accede to the request of the common council, that press representatives be admitted to the Board's meeting. What have the trustees to conceal from the public, who pay the bills?

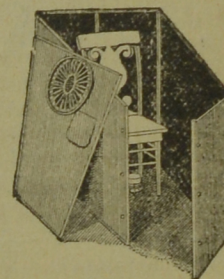
