

A HEARTY RECEPTION

Extended to the Duke and Duchess of York

ON THEIR ARRIVAL IN NEW ZEALAND.

Maoris in Native Costume Among Those to Welcome the Royal Visitors.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Auckland, New Zealand, June 11.—The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, who arrived here yesterday from Sydney, N. S. W., on board the steamer Ophir, landed this morning.

They were greeted with a salute from war ships in the harbor and popular demonstrations on land.

The town was crowded, among those gathered to greet the Duke and Duchess being many Maoris in native costume, in honor of the royal visitors.

The day was observed as a general holiday.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Boers Continue to Surrender to Kitchener—Albert County Soldier Killed.

London, June 11.—Lord Kitchener reports to the war office under date of Pretoria June 11, as follows: "Commandant Van Rensburg and his commando have surrendered at Petersburg. One hundred men have come in, and others are following."

Ottawa, June 11.—In the South African constabulary three deaths have been reported:

Trooper Edward Mullins died of enteric fever at Elandsfontein, May 31. He belonged to Albert county, N. B. Trooper William Hannon, of Kildare county, Ireland, died of enteric fever at Bloemfontein, May 27. Trooper Charles Hartbett, of Woonona, Man., died of wounds received at Rietfontein, May 21. This latter report indicates that the Canadians have been under fire.

The Moncton Transcript says: Trooper Edmund Mullins is the eldest son of Mr John Mullins, of Salem, Albert county, and is 21 years old. Prior to enlisting with the constabulary he worked on his father's farm in Albert Co., and was highly respected by all who knew him.

Washington, June 11.—It is understood that former President Kruger, of the Transvaal, will not visit the United States during the coming summer and fall.

CLAIMS HEAVY DAMAGES.

Professor Steen Sues Archbishop Bond for \$5000.

Montreal, June 11.—Action was this morning formally entered in the Superior court by Professor Steen, against Archbishop Bond in which the former claims \$5,000 damages and restoration of his rights as a priest of the church of England in Canada.

The case will not come on for trial before October, but will be pressed to the uttermost, many prominent churchmen having subscribed large sums to a fund to enable Mr Steen to secure what they consider his rights.
