H. V. B. Bridges Elected a
Member of the Senate.

**REV. DR. ROBERTS CREATED AN
HONORARY LIFE MEMBER OF
THE SOCIETY.**

The annual meeting of the associated alumni of the U. N. B. was held in the library of the college Wednesday evening with the president, J Douglas Hazen, M. P.P., in the chair. The other gentlemen in attendance were:

The report of the council to the society showed a membership of nearly three hundred, and receipts for the year amounting to \$399.54, against an expenditure of \$339.87, largely caused by the centennial celebration. The alumni gold medal for the best latin translation was awarded to Chester B. Martin of the junior class, and on the report of Dr. Scott, the council recommended that the Brydone-Jack memorial scholarship be awarded to H S Devlin for proficiency in second year mathematics and general standing for the year. The council also announced that Rev G Colbourne Heine of Montreal would speak for the society at the encennial exercises.

The report of the auditors, J D Phinney and B C Foster, was read to the meeting and adopted. It paid a warm tribute to the secretary treasurer, H V B Bridges for the manner in which he had discharged his duties.

On motion of Mr Phinney, seconded by Mr Mullin, Mr Bridges was created an honorary life member of the society in recognition of the valuable services rendered by him.

Both the mover and seconder of the resolution spoke very highly of Mr. Bridges, and pointed out that since he became secretary treasurer the society's membership had been largely increased, and funds were now being received from all parts of the world.

On motion of Dr. Cox, it was decided to recommend to the Senate the name of Robert Chalmers of R S C, of the geological department, Ottawa, for the honorary degree of LL.D. Mr. Chalmers is a native of Restigouche.

A letter was read from Dr Murray McLaren, declining renomination to the senate and returning thanks for the confidence reposed in him during the eight years he had the honor of representing the society in that body.

A resolution expressing regret at Dr McLaren's withdrawal, and returning thanks for the valuable services rendered by him to the University during his term of office, was unanimously adopted.

At his own request the name of F W Emmerson, of Sackville, was struck from the membership roll of the society.

The retiring president then vacated the chair and President Phinney in taking charge of the meeting, gracefully returned thanks for the honor conferred upon him.

On motion of Chancellor Harrison a hearty vote of thanks was presented to Mr Hazen for his valuable services, especially during the centennial celebration of last year.

Mr Hazen gracefully acknowledged the compliment paid him, and referred to the presence of so many distinguished educationalists at the centennial celebration as evidence of the esteem in which our University is held by the leading colleges of England and America. He also congratulated Dr Harrison upon the success of the celebration, which he attributed largely to his energetic efforts.

A few remarks along the same line were made by Mr. McCready. The latter informed the society that there was only one member who had retained standing in the society since its inception thirty-six years ago, and had in addition rendered most valuable services to the University. He had reference to Rev. Canon Roberts. He thought the society should recognize that gentleman's long and faithful service by creating him an honorary life member.

On motion of B C Foster the suggestion was carried into effect. The meeting then adjourned.
