The Close Season.

The open season for salmon fishing on the St. John river came to a close yesterday. The past season has been a fairly successful one, and some good catches have been made by fishermen at Douglas and Kingsclear.

Police Court.

A colored woman named Susan McIntyre, was convicted at the police court this morning, on the charge of assaulting Sheppard Hudlin, was fined \$3 and costs. Marsh has several other assault cases booked for next week.

Boy Injured.

Louis, the little three year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Farrell, while visiting his grandmother at Lincoln a few days ago, had the misfortune to fall and dislocate his left arm. Dr. Seery rendered the necessary medical attendance.

Serious Accident.

Arthur Edgar one of the night crew employed at the Aberdeen mill, had his right hand badly lacerated last night while working about a circular saw. He was immediately driven to the office of Dr. Bridges who rendered the necessary surgical aid.

Many Paid Up.

The city treasurer has not yet totalled up the amount of taxes paid on the year's assessment, but thinks that it will not be less than last year, when the discount was allowed on about \$34,000. Nearly \$20,000 was paid in during Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

A Colored Woman's Death.

Mrs. James Payne, a well known and respected colored woman, and widow of the late Joseph Payne, died at her home on the back road above town last night, after an illness brought on by the infirmities of age. She was about 87 years of age and leave one son, Henry Payne, with whom she resided. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock tomorrow morning. Robert B Adams, undertaker.

Enjoyable Picnic.

The salvation army picnic at Boiestown yesterday passed off very pleasantly and was an entire success. About three hundred persons went from here by special train, and about as many more were picked up at points along the route. The picnic was held on the vacant lot opposite Duffy's hotel, and was very largely attended.

Home from South Africa.

Corporal C. S. Babbitt, of the South African Constabulary, is in town. He was sent back to Canada in charge of Trooper Link, of the S. A. C., who has become demented. Link belongs to Manitoba. Corporal Babbitt's home is in Gagetown. He formerly was a member of the 8th Hussars, and expects to return to Africa shortly.—St. John Star.

The Exhibition Grant.

The finance committee of the city council, is in session this afternoon dealing with an application from the executive of the agricultural society for the payment of the additional one thousand dollars voted by the council towards the exhibition. It was understood that the money was not to be paid until next year but the exhibition managers find that they are unable to get along without it.

Mrs. Twining to Wed.

The Fredericton friends and acquaintances of Mrs. Ada L. Twining, who for several years resided here with her uncle, the late E. H. Wilnot, will be interested in know that she is shortly to be married to Capt. Baynes, an officer in the British army. The wedding was to have taken place on the 15th inst., but was postponed on account of the death of Miss Twining's fiancé. Mrs. Twining and her daughter are now residents of London, and have spent the last two winters in Cape Town South Africa.

Was at Majuba.

Capt. Ashburton a retired officer of the British army, drawing half pay, is on a visit to the city, and is a guest at the Queen. The Captain held a commission for a number of years and has seen considerable active service. He went through the first South African campaign, and was one of the few survivors of the terrible disaster which overtook the British

forces at Majuba Hill. He is very favorably impressed with New Brunswick, particularly the St. John River district and is thinking of locating near Fredericton.

Several of those persons spoke hopefully of the prospects for a successful race meeting and there seemed to be no doubt that the attractive purses offered will be the means of bringing together the greatest field of flyers ever seen in the Maritime Provinces.

The announcement was made that John McCoy was anxious to match his trotting stallion, Judge Wilkes, against any stallion in his class in the Maritime Provinces. The Judge has a record of 2.20 1/4. Providing a race can be arranged it will take place here during exhibition week.

TRAINS COLLIDE

Shocking Accident on the Northern Division of the I. C. R.

MARITIME EXPRESS DASHES INTO A FREIGHT TRAIN.

The Driver Killed and Fireman Fatally Injured.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Moncton, Aug 16.—The Maritime express due here this morning at 8.40 collided with the fast freight near Assetmaguahan. Driver Amos Sharp of the express was killed and the fireman is probably fatally injured.

The fast freight it seems was taking the siding at Assetmaguahan and had not cleared the main line when No. 34 came along. The engine of the Maritime express crashed into the rear car and the freight and engine were thrown from the rail.

Driver Sharp was killed instantly while Fireman Stevens was pinned beneath the wrecked engine where he remained for two hours before he could be extracted. None of the passengers were injured and there was very little damage done.

General Manager Russell's car was attached to the Maritime express. Crew on the fast freight escaped injury but the mail clerk of the Maritime had one of his hands slightly injured.

The fireman's injuries, it is feared, will prove fatal, although at nine o'clock this morning he was still alive.

The accident will result in delay of 8 hours to the Canadian Press Associations special which was expected to arrive at Moncton this morning at nine o'clock.

TIBBITS PRAISED.

Put up a Great Game at Halifax on Wednesday.

The Halifax Record in its account of the great ball game between the Standards and Resolutes at Halifax on Wednesday, has this to say:

"The Resolutes got their only run in the first inning, on a two base hit by Conroy, followed by a single by Stackpole, but thereafter only four men reached first base. Tibbits pitched great ball; after the first two men batted, only three scattering hits were made off him. Besides, he had splendid control, and he only gave one present of first. Nobody deserved more credit for the victory than he did.

Stackpole did masterly work for the champions, and had he been given similar support to Tibbits the Standards would not have had a run, as errors were the main factors in their scoring. Their first run was made in the second, when Leahy allowed Carter's hit to go through his legs, scoring Tibbits, and the other two in the third, when Curran came home on McLean's short throw to second, which bounded past Brown, O'Neill going to third and stealing home while Stackpole had his back turned in the pitcher's box with the ball in his hand. The nearest the Resolutes came to scoring was in the seventh; McLean opened with a two bagger over the third bag, and went to third on Kehoe's out; Gallagher then drove the ball for what was apparently a good safe hit to right, but Connors put up one hand above his head and made a phenomenal catch, such as has made Fenny of the Bostonians famous, and so closely came to doubling up McLean at third that there was quite an argument with Umpire Power over the decision. Tibbits however, got Fennimore on strikes, and there was no score.
