MARRIAGE IN QUEBEC.

Old French Law Which Permits Annulment of Two Catholics by a Protestant Minister.

Montreal, Jan. 28.—The marriage laws of the Province of Quebec, being in reality those of France under the Bourbons, have once more come into prominence in connection with what is known as the Delpit case. The belief is general from the facts made public and from a statement of the case prepared by the plaintiff himself that he is taking advantage of the technicalities of the law as it exists to have declared null a union contracted in good faith, and the effect of which declaration is to leave a woman who believed herself legally married without legal status as a wife and her children branded as illegitimate.

IN THE COMMONS.

In the House of Commons, Mr. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury, and Government leader in moving the address in reply to the message, said the House in all its long history, had never met under sadder circumstances or with a clearer duty to express the universal sorrow extending from end to end of the Empire. The sorrow was felt not only as a national but also as an irreparable personal loss. Never before had the national grief been so deeply seated. The end of a great epoch had come, and the cumulative result of a great ideal, of the great example of Queen Victoria was the greatest the world had ever seen. ESCAPED BULLETS: KILLED AT A FIRE.

Soldier-Fireman and a Comrade Victims of Explosion in a Match Factory.

Walkerville, Ont., Jan. 25.—Fire destroyed the storerooms of the Walkerville Match Factory this evening, with very sad results, two men being killed and several badly injured. The fire was noticed shortly after five o'clock, and the Walkerville fire brigade was very soon on hand, but owing to the very inflammable nature of the contents of the storeroom it had gained considerable headway. The firemen were making desperate efforts to stem the flames when suddenly there was a terrific explosion, and the whole roof was blown off, rafters, bricks, and a burning cinder being thrown hundreds of feet in the air. Shortly after, there was another explosion, and the end and side of the building were blown out, burning fireman George Phillips in the debris, and blowing the back of the head of another fireman, Wm. Brindle. About a dozen others were badly injured, but not seriously, with the exception of a lame toy named Honsten, whose spine was injured. Several others received cuts and bruises, and ex-Mayor Thomas Reid, chief of the brigade, was knocked down and badly stunned. The first explosion going through the roof of the building gave warning to the crowd to get away, or there would have been many more victims. The horses on the hook and ladder track stampeded after the explosion, and threw the driver off the track passing over him, and bruising him pretty badly. The truck was wrecked, and the horses badly cut up. The storerooms were about 200 feet back of the main building of the match factory and were totally destroyed, together with several thousand dollars worth of material. Corp. Geo. R. Phillips, who was killed, returned recently from South Africa, having been through the whole of the campaign and marched with the Royal Canadian, under Lord Roberts to Pretoria. He was one of the number who guarded the Boer prisoners and landed at St. Helena with them on the return voyage. He had just succeeded in hiding himself of a bad attack of rheumatism, contracted there, and started work again. He was a son of Rev. Mr. Phillips, of Black Heath, England. Wm. M. Brindle, the other victim, has been employed as head of the shipping department in Messrs. Parks, Davis & Co's laboratory here, and was well and favorably known. He was a son of William Brindle, of Cardinal, Ont., and a brother of Trooper H. M. Brindle, formerly of the N. W. M. police force. Mr. Brindle had just returned from his home a week ago, where he had been to welcome his brother home from the South African campaign. The Walkerville fire brigade is a volunteer one and the whole population of the town were wild with anxiety over the event.

MARTIN VS MCKINNON.

East Queens Election Case Now Before the Courts.

Charlottetown Jan. 18.—The election trial Martin vs McKinnon, was commenced today. It excites much interest there being over 200 witnesses in attendance; Attorney General Pugsley, of New Brunswick, was on motion of Attorney General Peters, granted permission to act as counsel for the respondent.

Mr. Haszard made application to amend the particulars by additions. After considerable argument the court agreed that the particulars should be admitted. Mr. Pugsley made application for the commitment of Martin for contempt of court in refusing to answer certain questions in the oral examination and also moved the objections to votes filed by the respondent on the ground that they were not filed six clear days before the day of trial. The motion for a rule nisi was not granted but the judges held that respondent's counsel could bring it up in another form. After some further arguing the court decided that tomorrow morning Martin will have to answer the questions, which he refused to answer before, Master Longworth, at an oral examination, to be conducted between 9 and 11.30 o'clock.
