NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences
Paraphrased for Herald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The railway train in which the Duke and Duchess will travel in Canada will be preceded by a pilot engine and their Royal Highnesses will be accompanied by half a dozen policemen.

Two boys, aged eight and ten years, sons of William Dappney, of Bony River, Charlotte county, were drowned Thursday. While their mother was away from home, the boys went to the river bathing, and both got beyond their depth. The bodies were recovered.

Edward Beupre, a giant from the Wood Mountain country, N. W. T., has left for Buffalo, where he will go on exhibition at the Pan-American as a sample of what grows on the western prairies of Canada. Beupre is twenty years of age, seven feet ten inches in height, and weighs 360 pounds.

A fire at the West India docks, London, Friday, destroyed a number of huge sheds and their contents. The amount of the damage done is estimated at from £100,000 to £250,000. Sugar and timber warehouses were involved in the conflagration. The custom house was damaged, but the vessels in the docks were removed in safety.

Five hundred lady teachers in Toronto have been trying to get their names on the voters' list, in order to get even with the aldermen who refused to increase their salaries. We are sorry they failed to get on the list; but five hundred maidens, young and fair to see, with good taste in such matters as shirt waists, ought to control enough votes in a little place like Toronto, to turn out the whole council.—Montreal Star.

The Department of Militia has received from the Governor-General, a request for the horses which are to be used as a mount for the Duke of Cornwall and York, his party and staff. The requisition calls for eight thoroughly trained chargers for the use of H. R. H. and party on review, and four other chargers which are to be blacks for the use of the staff; making a total of twelve chargers which the department will have to provide.

An accident in which three children, a pet frog and some dynamite figured at Albany on Friday resulted in one death, two persons seriously injured and part of a dwelling demolished. The three children of Geo. McCurry, a prominent contractor, found some dynamite in the cellar of their home, and thinking it was putty, fed it to their pet frog. The pieces of dynamite resembled insects and the frog ate them. A tool chest fell on the frog and exploded the dynamite. A chisel pierced the temple of one child and killed it. Another child and Mrs. McCurry, in the kitchen above, were seriously hurt, and that part of the house was wrecked.

Halifax will make elaborate preparations for the reception of their Royal Highnesses and Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York. A special committee of the City Council met Friday and decided to invite the Provincial Government and the army and navy to co-operate with the council in making the celebration as striking as possible. The streets through which the royal party will pass will be lined on either side by bunting, suspended in continuous strings from poles. Canopies will be raised at different points, and arches will be constructed along the line of march. The city hall, provincial buildings and other public structures will be superbly draped. The naval and military display will be participated in by all the regular forces and local militia. An effort will also be made to have the Dominion Government bring in the suburban militia brigades.

HAMILTON'S TRIBUTE

To Gallant Canadian Soldiers in South Africa.

Speaking at the Dominion day celebration at London, Gen. Ian Hamilton said he felt that there was fitness in his being there that night, for he had always felt that his first promotion was really attributable to the help which he received in the Nile campaign of 1885 from a Canadian voyageur. He could not tell in words what he owed to Colonel Otter and the Canadian Regiment, the Canadian Battery, and the Canadian Mounted Rifles, who came his way and helped him out in South Africa. He always found in his career that it had never done him any harm with Canadians to have been born and bred with the Gordon Highlanders. (Cheers.) There was, he thought, a very close connection between the Canadians and Scotland, (cheers), and in the present war Highlanders and Canadians had fought together, shoulder to shoulder, and together they had fallen. He described in glowing terms how the Canadians on the march from Bloemfontein to Pretoria gallantly turned the position at Israel's Poort, and remarked that their occupation of that place was really the triumph of individual intelligence. Personally he thought that the wars of the future would be to those who could develop individual intelligence. After referring to the great assistance which the chairman had rendered in connection with this war, he expressed the hope that the bonds between the mother country and the colonies, which had been drawn so closely together by a cruel war, would be riveted together in times of peace. (Cheers.)

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.

Tax Endowment Rank to Raise Big Deficit.

Chicago, June 13.—The Supreme Lodge, Knights of Pythias, has decided to raise the insurance rate to the maximum prescribed by the National Fraternal Congress, to meet the deficiency of \$500,000 in the treasury of the Endowment Rank.

If in this way money shall not be forthcoming, it is likely a special assessment of 50 cents will be put on every member of the order for the benefit of the Endowment Rank. The only immediate action which will be taken by the board of control will be, it is said, the instituting of some foreclosure suits in an endeavor to rescue as much as possible of the money said to have been carelessly invested.

Final action of the Supreme Lodge was practically unanimous for the higher rates, which place the whole burden on members of the endowment Rank, only four delegates voting in the negative.

It was ordered that when the old losses were paid off and a surplus began to accumulate, the board of control should have authority to pass a regular monthly assessment as often as possible.

WONDERFUL ENGINEERING FEAT.

A Norwegian Steamer Changes Shaft and Propeller in Mid-Ocean.

Victoria, B. C., July 12.—Officers and crew of the Norwegian tramp steamer Guernsey have performed a most feat of marine engineering. Losing their propeller and shaft in mid-ocean, they shifted the cargo until the stern of the boat was tilted high in the air and then put in a new propeller and shaft.

The captain of the Kaga Maru says he sighted the Guernsey July 1 far out in the Pacific. Her captain came alongside and said they had broken their tail shaft and lost their propeller, and their condition of helplessness was grave in the extreme. Fortunately, under recent regulations of the underwriters which compel each ves-

sel to carry an extra shaft and propeller, these were on board, but the difficulty of shipping them was so great as to appear almost insurmountable.

Favored by calm weather and quiet sea, however, the captain decided to make the attempt. The ship being in ballast, her cargo was moved forward until her bow was deep in water and her stern was elevated until the propeller shaft was clear of water. Rafts were improvised and a nine-ton propeller lowered. The propeller shaft was placed in position without great difficulty, but the swell of the ocean and crude appliances at hand made the task of shipping the huge screw almost impossible. Repeated attempts only resulted in failure, until finally by the skipper's orders two opposite blades were cut off. Thus lightened, the screw was at last got into position, and Captain Kroghanson expected to get under way with his dual-bladed propeller the next day.

The Kaga Maru was detained for about an hour and a half by the incident, when, as she could be of little service, she steamed away.

TWO GUNS FOR CANADA.

Cannon Used by the British Contingent China Field Force, Presented to Canadian Government.

Ottawa, July 13.—Canada is to have two guns which were used in the Chinese campaign. His Excellency Lord Minto yesterday received the following message from the Lieut General, commanding the British contingent, China field force: "Sir, I have the honour to inform you that the principal ordnance officer of the China field force has under instructions from me, despatched the two guns shown in the attached statements for presentation to the Canadian Government. The guns were shipped at Taku on the 9th May, and have been consigned through to Ottawa, via Shanghai and Vancouver, to the address of Col Pinault, in charge of militia defences."

The guns are made of brass, smooth bore, weighing 4 cwt., No. 3, 25 calibre, five feet long. These guns have Chinese inscriptions and have rings cast on them. Colonel Pinault thinks that the guns were got through the interest of Major Boulanger, of Quebec, who was in South Africa, and afterwards in China at the capture of Pekin.

PROTECTING ROYAL PARTY.

Special Arrangements Which Will be Made for Care of Duke of York.

Ottawa, July 13.—It is said that at Rideau Hall special interest is being taken in the arrangements for the protection of the Royal party while they are in Canada, and that the arrangements for this protection will be very complete. It is stated that the secret police will be considerably augmented for the time the Duke is in Canada, and that only picked men will be engaged. All trains arriving in cities where the Royal visitors are staying will be closely watched for suspicious characters, and if any are found, it is said they will be arrested and detained until it is deemed safe to set them free again. As there are certain to be extra large congregations of people wherever the future King and Queen travel in Canada, it is expected that there will also be large numbers of the preying class, and these the police in the different cities will keep a sharp lookout for.

The protection of the Duke and his party while travelling will devolve upon the railway company in so far as safety is concerned. Before the Royal train a pilot engine will travel, and the Royal train will have precedence on all lines. It is not expected that there will be much delay to the regular train service.
