SPOTS ON THE SUN.

The Sun intimates that the Herald is afraid of discussion in the York county bye election. The statement is peculiar in view of the fact that the Sun has repeatedly called attention to the alleged fact that the Herald had become a campaign publication. We have been discussing the approaching contest for some weeks, and may claim some credit for bringing about present conditions, which are not pleasing to the Sun. Our contemporary has also contributed quite a large volume to the literature of the occasion and has created a great deal of dissension in its party, and rather than muzzle it, the Herald will be pleased if the Sun continues rendering good service to the Liberal candidate.

We have endeavored to point out to the Sun that in advocating Mr. McLeod's candidature it was going against its own party in this constituency, but it has shunned good advice, and continues a course distasteful to its friends in York. The Sun makes a grave mistake in assuming that Mr. McLeod is the candidate of the Conservative party. He was certainly nominated at a convention calling itself Conservative, but the representative men of the party were not present, neither are they enlisted in Mr. McLeod's campaign. The Sun should be better acquainted with its own party in York than to think that Mr. Pitts, Mr. McLeod and a few other malcontents constitute the entire Conservative outfit in this constituency. It is in recognizing these people that the Sun has blundered and called down upon itself the condemnation of the real Conservative party in this locality. The men whom the Sun is championing are mere political adventurers, and the party organ is making a mistake in taking up their cause. We have repeatedly pointed this out to the Sun, and it has been given the same view by its own party friends, but apparently it lacks appreciation of the Herald's efforts to set it right.

In conclusion the Sun is assured that there is nothing in the York campaign that the Herald or Mr. Gibson desire to keep out of sight. The Liberal candidate appeals to the electors of York as one who has large industrial interests in the county, and as claiming a right to represent it in parliament. He has been elected to the legislature and parliament by substantial majorities, and would be a member of the latter to-day but for the interference of the man whom the Sun is now trying to impose on the county, and whose course in protesting the last election was very warmly opposed by the president of the Sun Publishing Company.

THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

The Herald's effort to rid the municipal council of party politics is bearing some fruit. One of the Douglas candidates declares for the same thing, and he is a Conservative. Mr. McFarlane at the N. B. weeks meeting hit the nail on the head. There has been too much one man power in the council, or as Mr. McFarlane put it, the man with the big book ran the whole thing. In nominating their candidates the electors in the various parishes should secure a pledge that the new councillors will attend strictly to the business for which they are elected, and not attempt to make the council a donkey engine to any particular party. We have hope that the conditions which have prevailed for some years are at an end, and that the new council will be

one free from political manipulations, and concerned only in giving its best attention to the county business. We have enough politics without the municipal council dabbling in party squabbles. The county has been taught a lesson, and the men who come to the new council should profit by it.

THE EXHIBITION.

All signs point to a highly successful exhibition in this city next week. The management have had many difficulties to contend with, but the gentlemen who have worked so industriously, and enthusiastically to make the affair go, already feel rewarded by the promise of a big show and a large attendance of visitors from all parts of the province.

The arrangements for the exhibition are well advanced, the space is well taken, and only fine weather is necessary to record a great success.

While giving much attention to the material features of the exhibition, the management have not neglected the lighter shades, and will present a variety of amusements to please all tastes.

The exhibition will be formally opened by Governor McClellan on Tuesday next, and will continue during the three following days.

A GROSS OUTRAGE.

In Cape Breton some rural Presbyterian congregations still adhere to the practice of holding out door communion services in the summer season, and the occasions draw a large concourse of people from miles around. Abuses have grown up in connection with the gatherings, but the most outrageous one developed at a recent gathering at Catalone, Cape Breton Co.

On August 27th hundreds of people visited Catalone to partake of the sacrament on the shore of the picturesque Lake Catalone. While the solemn ceremony was in progress, a man named John Snow stood in his wagon a short distance away and sold all sorts of intoxicants to all who were willing to give him the requisite coin. Naturally the church members were very indignant when they heard of Snow's audacity, and on the following day information was laid against him. County Magistrate Townsend fined him \$50 and \$19 costs for violation of the Canada Temperance Act.

An ordinary fine seems mild punishment for a man so depraved as to be guilty of the offence of which Snow was convicted.

An interesting public institution is the Indian school situated at Brandon, Manitoba, and drawing its pupils from the reserves about Lake Winnipeg. It is under the management of the Methodist church, but is inspected and also supported by the Dominion government. There are now 106 children between the ages of ten and sixteen in attendance, and the proportion of boys and girls is about even. There is a staff of twelve, including a farmer, carpenter, cook, house-keeper and seamstress, all of whom give instruction, in addition to the ordinary school work. All of the house-work is done by the Indian girls, while the boys have chief credit for the excellent condition of the crops of all sorts grown on the school farm.

Ex-Mayor C. B. Archibald of Truro, whose death is announced, was one of the sterling men of that town. Starting life as a stage driver, he accumulated considerable means and was the first mayor of his native town, serving several terms in that capacity and rendering faithful work. A son of the deceased gentleman is Mr. L. B. Archibald, superintendent of the I. C. R. Pullman and dining car service.
