LETTING IN THE LIGHT.

How often have some of our readers been at a political convention and observed the manipulations for personal ends. Questions of right and wrong, of the party platform were not discussed. The main point "how can we gain the election?"

The above quotation is the tail end of a very wise and high toned dissertation by Mr. Pitts on "where party loyalty is landing some people" and the inference seems irresistible that he had in his mind the last Tory Convention in York when Rev. Dr. McLeod with his platform of "Parity, Patriotism and Prohibition," was nominated in a florid speech by our late lamented citizen, John Black.

Mr. Pitts has been a politician himself, and of course knows something of how campaigns are managed. His association on a ticket with Black and Pinder must have given him a very liberal education in that line.

AN ENORMOUS ENTERPRISE.

Mr. Clerge whose name has come into prominence in Canada through the gigantic iron and steel enterprise he is establishing at Sault Ste Marie, his contract to supply steel rails to the federal government for the Intercolonial railway, is a gentleman whose advent into this country with his enormous capital for the development of our resources should be most warmly welcomed.

The 600 ton mill now being constructed is 1,500 feet long and 300 feet wide. One thousand men are at work on it. Mr. Clerge is at present employing between 7,000 and 8,000 men on his various works between Sudbury and Michipicoten. Trains are now running on fifty miles of the Algoma Central Railway, and contractors are at work on the other 150 miles of the line, including the Michipicoten branch.

Rev. C. A. Eaton, the clever young Baptist minister who hails from Nova Scotia, has been pastor of Blair street church, Toronto, and has been called to a big church and generous salary in Chicago, is only 32 years old. The Toronto Globe greatly laments his removal from that city.

On a want of confidence vote in the House of Commons at Ottawa last night, the government was sustained by a majority of 42 in rather a thin House. Two of the independents, Richardson of Selkirk and Robinson of West Elgin, voted with the government.

The Dominion Government is going to erect a new national museum in Major's Hill Park, Ottawa. The building will have a frontage of 180 feet and will be surmounted by an observatory, where astronomical work will be carried on.

Dr. Tanner, an Irish Nationalist member of the Imperial parliament, who used to make considerable stir in that body, died last week of consumption, aged 51. He had represented the Middle Division of Cork continuously since 1885.

The Government of British Columbia is asking the legislature of that province to authorize them to make a loan of \$5,000,000 for the construction of railways.

THE LUMBER DRIVES.

Very Favorable Reports From The Upper St. John.

W. H. Murray's the St. John lumber King who was in the city today, informed The Herald that the latest advices received by him from the lumber drives on the Upper St. John were of a most encouraging nature, and that he was of opinion that all the logs in that section would be got out without difficulty.

The lumber drives on the Orontoc and tributaries, amounting to about three million feet, were got out several days ago. Gilman Bros & Borden's drive on the Pokio stream, amounting to about five million feet, is not yet out, but is believed to be coming along nicely.

ORANGE GRAND LODGE.

A Fredericton Man Elected Grand Master for the ensuing year.

Campbellton, April 25.—At yesterday's session of the Orange Grand Lodge resolutions were passed regretting the death of the Queen, expressing loyalty to the new King and condemning the Dominion Parliament for passing the resolution in favor of eliminating the clause in the coronation oath which is objectionable to Roman Catholics.

A petition was presented for the separation of the county of York into two county jurisdictions, one of which to be composed of the primary lodges at McAdam, Prince William, Dumfries, Southampton, Upper Queensbury and Central Hainesville. It was adopted, subject to a sufficient number of the lodges of York endorsing such separation.

HE SCORED COOK

S. H. Blake Gave The Old Man a Bad Hour.

BEFORE THE SENATE INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE.

"Thank God, He is Not in the Senate, and Not Likely Ever to Be."

Ottawa, April 25.—In the senate committee yesterday in the Cook charges inquiry, A H Marsh took the forenoon reviewing the evidence for Mr Cook. H said the case against Cameron and Preston was proved up to the hilt. In respect to Sir Richard Cartwright he admitted the case was not all one way. There was something to be said on the part of the defence. But, he said, if it was true against Cartwright then it was also true against Laurier. The premier was as far in the mire as the other was in the mud.

Mr Blake started at 8 o'clock last evening and made a two hours' address. He regretted that the name of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was dragged into it in the end by Mr. Marsh's address. The character of the premier was part of the people. "I submit," said Mr. Blake, "that it was not fair to make an assault upon him, because Sir Wilfrid swore he had nothing to do with the transaction and did not know anything about it until 1900."

Mr Blake referred to the means which Mr Cook took to obtain a seat in the senate, and he did so because he knew that they would repudiate the idea that such was the ordinary means of obtaining an entrance into that august assembly. He (Cook) used his religion, his race (for he said he was a U. E. Loyalist), the money that he expended; he even turned to holy writ and compared himself to St Paul, showing how he labored and went to the Old Testament as well. A programme of that kind was not surely the means to obtain an entrance to the senate.

There was nothing to show in any of the letters produced that money was the object in deciding a senatorship. As far as Cook was concerned, he was desirous of striking at the premier. If his oath against Sir Wilfrid was false then it was false against Sir Richard.

In the letter of August 25 from Cook to Cameron, the writer said he would return Cameron's two letters so that there would be nothing on record, knowing how cautious Mr Cameron was in matters of that kind. He invited Cameron to write freely on this account. After doing this he proceeded to make copies of his friend's letters, and, four years afterwards, when his friend's tongue was closed, he produced these letters in judgment against him. He also used these same letters against the two men who stood by him and who would have given a senatorship if they could.

"Thank God," said Mr. Blake, "he is not in the senate and not likely ever to be." A man of that kind was without honor and where there is no honor there is no truth. Cook was embittered, he was a man with a grievance. If the senatorship was a question of money, Mr Blake asked why all the interviewing of ministers and the writing of letters? Why not strike the bargain at once? In conclusion, Mr Blake said that books told them that the man who peached on his accomplice was without honor and that an informer was infamous. He (Blake) again thanked God that Cook was not in the senate, but that he was living in that infamy to which he consigned himself and which he so richly deserved.

The committee adjourned until today when it will meet to consult with Mr Ritchie. After the meeting of the Cook committee yesterday morning, W T R Preston met A H Marsh, counsel for Cook, at the Russell House. Preston stepped up to Marsh and called him a "mean, low, cowardly liar," Marsh retorted that Preston was a liar, to which Preston said that Marsh was a purchasable liar. There were no blows, although there were a few lively minutes in the vestibule of the hotel.
