To Load Deals.

New Law Office.

To Start Next Week.

The shoe factory which has been closed down for a few days to permit of stock taking, and also the overhauling of the machinery, will start up again next week.

New Roller Mill.

Canterbury is to have a roller mill, to grind wheat by the Hungarian process. It is to be established by Harvey Clarke, and he expects to have it running by next fall.

A Science Prize.

Mrs. Dr. Conlath, with a desire to perpetuate the kindly relations between her late husband and the educational interests of Fredericton, has offered to provide an annual prize for the science

department in the High school. It is needless to say the trustees accepted the generous offer and will be glad to have the name of their late chairman thus kept before the eyes of the public.

The Lottimer Estate

Messrs R. L. Savage and L. H. Higgins, inspectors for the Lottimer estate, met Wednesday afternoon and opened the tenders for the purchase of the stock in hand and book debts. Only two offers were received, they being from J. P. McManis and Morley H. Lottimer, and the figures were substantially the same. The offer was both declined but the inspectors afterwards submitted a proposition to the tenderers, which Mr. Lottimer accepted, and the stock was accordingly handed over to him. It is understood that he pays for it a sum equal to about 33 cents on the dollar.

Well Deserved Vacation.

Miss Ida McAdam, of the Charlotte Street School, is among the oldest members of the city school staff as well as one of the most popular and successful. In view of having completed twenty-five years of service, the Trustees at their last meeting recognized this fact by giving her two months leave of absence. Her vacation is to begin on Wednesday next, and she will not be required to report for duty until the last of August.

FOR SOUTH AFRICA

A Chance for School Teachers From New Brunswick.

TO ACQUIRE WEALTH AND DISTINCTION IN SOUTH AFRICA.

They are Wanted in the Transvaal And Orange River Colonies.

GOOD ORGANIZERS WHO CAN RIDE AND SHOOT MAY HAVE THE PREFERENCE.

Dr. Inch, chief superintendent of education, is in receipt of a letter from Mr. E. D. Sargent, director of education for the Transvaal and Orange River colonies, asking whether New Brunswick teachers would accept employment in those colonies. Accompanying the letter to the chief superintendent were a number of blank forms of application, which teachers who would like to follow their vocation in South Africa can obtain from the education office.

It might be added, by way of explanation, that Mr. Sargent visited Canada last year with the object of studying the school system of the various provinces. While in Canada he received a cable gram from Sir Alfred Milner, the British High Commissioner in South Africa, asking him if he would undertake the educational work of the two new colonies, and he replied in the affirmative.

Mr. Sargent was most favorably impressed with New Brunswick's school system, and in his letter to Dr. Inch states that he wants to procure the services of experienced teachers who would be of assistance to him in establishing an educational system in the new colonies similar to that in vogue in New Brunswick. He intimates that the government would be willing to pay the travelling expenses to and from South Africa of men capable of doing organization work, providing they would consent to remain in the country for at least a year. He does not, however, guarantee travelling expenses to all teachers who apply for work and are accepted.

In the blank forms of application, the teacher is to state his name and address, condition of his health past and present, post and approximate salary demanded, length of experience, and knowledge (if any) of Dutch and native languages. The applicant must also state if he has had experience in athletics and whether or not he can ride and shoot, and furnish satisfactory references and testimonials as to his ability to teach.

As above stated, Mr. Sargent made a study of the school systems of all the large provinces of Canada, and in deciding in favor of New Brunswick he has certainly paid our educational system and authorities a very great compliment.

THE CRIMEAN WAR.

Very Interesting Lecture at the Methodist Church by Pastor Campbell.

Rev. Mr. Campbell's lecture on the Crimean War in the vestry of the Methodist church last evening was listened to with pleasure by about three hundred people. The rev. gentleman held the undivided attention of the audience for nearly two hours, and gave one of the most interesting addresses of the kind ever heard from the public platform in this city. In his opening remarks he recited the causes which led up to the great struggle

in the Crimea, then dwelt upon the scenes attending the declaration of war, such as the mobilization and embarkation of troops for the front, and afterwards treated his hearers to a detailed and graphic account of the great battles of Alma, Balaclava and Inkerman. His references to the heroic conduct of the British troops, particularly the work of the Highlanders at Alma and the historic charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava, aroused the audience to a great pitch of enthusiasm. The lecturer in the course of his remarks paid an eloquent tribute to Florence Nightingale, that angel of mercy who did so much to alleviate the sufferings of the British soldier during the arduous Crimean campaign, and he also referred to the brilliant work of the Gordon Highlanders on the Indian frontier a few years ago, in order to show that the British soldier of today possessed the same fighting qualities as the British soldier of history.

The reverend gentleman's subject was appropriately illustrated by stereoscopic views thrown upon a large square of cotton. This branch of the entertainment was attended to by Harry D. White, Lieut. Col. Dunbar, D. O. C., presided over the gathering in a most acceptable manner.

At the close a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Dr. Inch, and seconded by W. J. Osborne, was presented to the lecturer and gracefully acknowledged by him.
