BRETHREN AT VARIANCE.

Speaking at a temperance meeting at Toronto a few weeks ago, Hon. Geo. E. Foster declared himself in favor of state control of the liquor traffic by means of the Gothenburg system in operation in the Netherlands, but the ex-prohibition leader evidently is not going to lead all his temperance friends in that direction. Apparently he cannot even collar his own relatives. At the prohibition convention at Truro yesterday, some twenty delegates being present, Rev Dr. McLeod said he had looked into the Gothenburg system, and discussed it freely. After 30 years use, Sweden pronounced it the most iniquitous form of licensing debauching and illusive, and he would fight tooth and nail against it coming into Canada. He hoped Canada would not be deluded into allowing the system here. He pictured a scene of absolute political control, with most debased rummies filling positions dispensed by the government, with the Gothenburg system in Canada.

There now Mr. Foster, what do you think of that for a send off for your Gothenburg system. What a pity to see these two distinguished Tory kinsmen, who have in the past fought and bled the country in unison on the temperance question, now at daggers drawn. Evidently Dr. McLeod thinks Mr. Foster is degenerating on the temperance question, and of Mr. Foster's opinion of Dr. McLeod, well perhaps he smiles as he recalls what a revenue producer prohibition proved for the Doctor.

It may be added that the prohibition convention of twenty delegates over which Dr McLeod presided at Truro, also denounced by strong resolutions, Mr Foster's coddling of the Gothenburg system, but when the ex-finance minister is reminded of that, he can point to the sliminess of the convention which undertook to indirectly censure him for his recent utterances at Toronto.

MR. LONGLEY TALKS.

The Attorney General of Nova Scotia who has just returned from his honeymoon trip to England, in an interview with the press gives some interesting views on current questions in the old country. After a complimentary reference to Lord Strathcona, Mr. Longley said he found that Canada's action in extending a preference to British goods is appreciated in the abstract, but the great mercantile and commercial classes do not seem to take a very sanguine view as to its results. At the present moment the British manufacturers seem much agitated over American competition, especially in iron and steel. The formation of the great American steel trust is regarded as foreshadowing the downfall of British supremacy in the manufacture of iron and steel.

Regarding the South African war, Mr. Longley said most people on the other side of the water, are heartily sick of it, but have no alternative now but to go forward and crush the guerilla bands now resisting British authority. The utmost confidence is felt that Kitchener's forces are adequate to crush all opposition and restore order at an early date.

The program which the Herald mentioned some months ago, Sir Louis Davies for the supreme court bench, and Hon. H. R. Emmerson for Minister of Marine and Fisheries, is now open to the government. The selection of Westmorland's M.P., for a cabinet position would be most cordially received in New Brunswick.

The Toronto Star describes Hon. Mr. Blair as "A lion that takes baiting patiently, but sometimes he gives a roar that shakes his tormentors." The same correspondent mentions that after Mr. Haggart had made an altogether unwarranted and untruthful statement regarding the I. C. R., the Minister of Railways responded with the polite but forcible intimation that "I absolutely dissent from the accuracy of that statement." Mr. Haggart sank back and gasped. The Minister had, in Parliamentary language, actually insinuated that Haggart wasn't telling the truth!

Both in the Supreme Court at Ottawa and in the House of Commons yesterday, eloquent tributes were paid to the memory of the late Judge King. Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada, said that the deceased gentleman was a great lawyer, especially in the department of commercial law. He was probably the best commercial lawyer in the dominion, especially familiar with shipping law generally in its larger sense. He had earned celebrity for rendering judgments noted for their clearness of expression and sound learning.

Jeremy Taylor has proved himself a good banker and an excellent citizen, and it is with sincere regret that this community hears of his being removed to another sphere of action. Mr. Taylor has lived here long enough to fall in love with the place and the citizens, as every stranger does, and he would prefer remaining in Fredericton, but must obey the call of his employers. It is promotion for him too, so this fact mingles the regrets of his friends with their hearty congratulations.

The local Tory organ observes "how much the Conservative party in this province has suffered during the past twenty years for want of Mr King's broad statesmanship, brilliant leadership, and personal attractiveness, we need not now regretfully speculate." This is a severe reflection on Mr. Foster who seems to be abandoned by all his Tory friends, even by Dr. McLeod, who denounces Mr. Foster's substitute for prohibition.

The neglect of the Tory Government to provide adequate winter communication between P. E. Island and the mainland, as required by the terms of Confederation, has resulted in Parliament voting an additional annual subsidy of \$30,000 to the Island. Tory rule, or rather misrule cost the country dearly.

Summer grew scandalized at observing winter lingering so long in the lap of spring, and has arrived unexpectedly on the scene. Those who were grumbling last week at the cold weather are mopping their brows today and complaining of the heat.

It is reported that the great Morgan syndicate has gobbled up the property of the Nova Scotia Steel Company in Pictou County, at North Sydney and Newfoundland, and will establish an enormous steel producing plant at North Sydney.

The Board of Education is inclined to lend a willing ear to the request from South Africa for the loan of some of our school teachers, and it is probable that a contingent will shortly embark for that country.

Editor Simonds wants all the election petitions dropped, while Editor Pitts is anxious to push the one against Mr. Gibson. And thus doth harmony reign in the local Tory ranks.

The Senate has unanimously passed the bill making May 24, a statutory holiday, and all it requires now to make it law is the assent of the Governor General.

Mr. Pitts, in his newspaper, is lecturing the city clergymen on their duty, what they should preach about etc.

Hon Messrs Farris and LaBillois, are arranging a joint official trip through the river counties for June.
