FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The Dominion Iron & Steel Company has declared a dividend of 3 1-2 per cent on its preferred stock.

Four children were bitten by a mad dog in Jersey City seven weeks ago, and one boy of eight years has just died of hydrophobia.

We respectfully suggest to H.R.H. the Duke, that before he leaves Canada he should make Major Maude a Duchess.—Bellville Intelligencer.

Patrick Delay, the oldest resident of London, Ont., died Saturday, aged 104 years. He was a native of Ireland, but had spent the greater part of his life in Canada.

Hugh John Macdonald arrived in Toronto Thursday, and explained he was out of politics. Perhaps Hugh John can satisfy a gaping world by describing when, where and how he was ever in politics.—Montreal Herald.

According to the Act passed after the assassination of Garfield, the Presidential succession in the event of the death or resignation of a president and vice-president in the same term, goes to the Secretary of State and then in turn to each of the cabinet.

The Plains of Abraham have at last been transferred to the city of Quebec by the Federal Government, the last signatures to the deeds of transfer having been placed to the document Friday. The Ursuline Nuns have received their cheque from the Federal Government, and have also purchased from Alderman Tanguay, M.L.A., Marchmont, the property adjoining the Plains, and handed him over a cheque for \$49,500.

An Italian miner at the Elk Mine, Colorado, remarked Friday that all Kings and Presidents should be killed and that it was the right thing to kill McKinley. Three hundred miners gathered at the shaft house, waited until the fellow appeared, placed a rope around his neck and started for a railway trestle. On the advice of some of the crowd the man's life was spared, but he was badly choked and driven out of the camp by the miners with drawn revolvers.

Prof. Goldwin Smith and Mrs. Smith have made a gift of \$10,000 to the library of Toronto University. In the letter accompanying the gift, the donors refer to the celebration of the millenary of King Alfred, the patron hero and legendary founder of Prof. Smith's old college at Oxford, and state that the donation is intended as a means of paying tribute to the "restorer of English learning," as well as a mark of interest in Toronto University.

The captain of a small oyster sloop, which has been dredging in the Upper Chesapeake Bay, reports that a Pole employed on an oyster boat, on reading the story of President McKinley's assassination, exclaimed: "Good, and Teddy will be the next in a short time." The crew set upon him and severely beat him, rendering him unconscious. The captain and mate intervened, but the latter, when the master had gone after the crew, picked the unconscious form up and threw it overboard.

A woman writer in the Montreal Herald says: The general verdict is that the Duchess of Cornwall and York, or Princess May, as she used to be called, is very much prettier than her pictures. She has a wonderfully sweet, though rather grave expression, and her whole bearing is dignified and gracious. The Duchess, it was observed, has a beautiful complexion, and her hair, which is golden brown, was very daintily arranged. Her costume was very simple. A black gown, black hat and feather collar made an ensemble which spoke of good taste and simplicity.

The largest timber sale in Ontario since 1892 took place last week at the Parliament buildings, Toronto, when limits of an area of 399 1/2 square miles were sold by auction for \$732,787.50, an average of \$1,835 per square mile. The result of the sale was regarded with a good deal of satisfaction by the Department of Crown Lands, as the limits offered were not of

the choicest character. The terms of the sale require that the pine be removed from the limits within ten years. The Government receive, in addition to the bonus, a ground rent of \$3 a square mile, and a stumpage tax of not less than \$1.25 per thousand feet, board measure, or \$25 per thousand feet cubic measure. The last large sale was in 1899, when 360 square miles were sold for \$723,650 or \$2,010 a mile.

S. S. CONVENTION.

The Provincial Gathering to be Held in Fredericton in October.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR INTENDING DELEGATES.

Homes to be Provided Free.

The place of the Provincial Sunday School Convention is Fredericton.

The time is October 8th, 9th and 10th. The first session begins at 2.30 o'clock on the afternoon of the 8th.

Who may be delegates?

All pastors; five county officers from each county as elected in county convention, or their substitutes; two delegates appointed from each Sunday school; normal graduates; and of course all officers of the provincial association. Credential forms will be found folded in the programme sent as a supplement within the Advocates mailed to superintendents, pastors, and others, if county officers have sent addresses on Form 2.

How to get there. Delegates over all railways in the province will secure a first-class ticket at the station from which they start. On the I. C. R., C. P. R., and Hillsboro Railway, each person must ask for a "Standard Certificate" with their ticket. This certificate being signed in convention will be exchanged at Fredericton or St. Marys station for a return ticket free. Do not fail to get a "Standard Certificate" with your ticket.

The Shore Line Railway and also the Kent Northern Railway will issue return tickets for single fare to St. John, to all who are going to convention. Also, the Central, Moncton and Buctouche, Hampton and St. Martins railways will issue the return ticket in exchange for a certificate obtained from the secretary of the convention.

Delegates over the I. C. R. may secure through tickets and avoid getting a second ticket at St. John.

The Canada Eastern railway gives free return to delegates over their road.

Will all pastors going to convention please use the "Standard Certificate" instead of their half fare permits?

Tickets may be obtained three days before convention, but will not continue good later than third day after convention, Sunday excluded.

Delegates on all the St. John River boats will ask for ticket to Sunday School Convention at Fredericton.

Delegates names should be forwarded to Mr. A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton, to reach him not later than October 1st. The Credential Forms should be filled in and presented by each delegate.

Homes will be provided by Fredericton friends for all whose names are thus forwarded. But do not send the name of a delegate who cannot go. If a name be sent, and later another name is substituted, or no one can go, be sure to notify Mr. McFarlane.

The Credential Forms should be taken with the delegate. Go direct from the station to the Methodist school room. Present your credentials, register, receive your badge and the appointment to a home.

Seek to be a blessing in that home. Be prompt at every session. Be present for the preparatory half hours led by Mr. MacDonald, and let God work in you and by you.

Our beloved William Reynolds used to say to delegates: "Take with you a Bible, pencil, notebook and pocketbook. Take home from convention a true consecration for work, a full note book of principles expounded, an ensam to sustain you in working them out in your school life."

The convention badge will be red. The local committee at boats and train will be recognized by an additional blue badge.

The Canadian Hymnal will be used in the sessions. It would be appropriate to bring your own copy with your name written on the outside.

A St John despatch to the Halifax Herald says the liabilities of Merritt Bros., have not been made up, but are estimated at from \$300,000 to half a million. It is believed that the Eisenbauer firm of Lunenburg, is a creditor for \$25,000; Thomson & Sons, shipping men here, about the same; the Bank of Montreal, Joseph Finlay, wholesale grocer; W. H. Murray, lumberman, some \$20,000 each. The Geo. L. Slipp estate is said to be a creditor for \$13,000.

Duke and Duchess of York

HAVE AN INTERESTING FAMILY OF FOUR.

They are Being Reared Simply and Judiciously.

In the general rejoicings and festivities, and the pomp attendant upon the triumphal progress of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York through the colonies, it is not generally remembered that there are some sacrifices connected with such a long journey. The duchess is a very devoted mother to her four bonny, healthy children, and yet for seven months and a half she is obliged to be away from them. Sometimes in the course of the journey she is out of reach even of cable communication, and probably suffers great anxiety as to the welfare of her small children.

Princess Victoria is said to have cheered her mother at parting by saying protectingly:

"Don't worry, mother. I'll take care of us;" but other care than that of a 4 year-old princess is needed, and the royal children are for the most part in the care of Queen Alexandra and the Princess Victoria, who is said to be a very devoted aunt.

Queen Alexandra has given so much attention to her grandchildren, in the absence of their parents, that she has quite made devoted grandmothers fashionable in London society.

Little Prince Edward of York is the best known of the children, and his love of soldiers and manly callings is often spoken of. He is as fond of "playing war" as any other small boy. A funny story in this connection was told lately: Prince Edward is always most considerate and courteous to any guest who may be invited to join in the royal tea parties. One young lady is an especial favorite in the nursery, as directly the meal is over she is ready for a game. The other day the game chosen was, as usual, soldiers. "I," said Prince Edward, "will be Lord Kitchener, and you (to the lady) shall be De Wet. But you'll have to run very fast, for he's a very difficult person to catch." Then ensued a wild scrimmage. Suddenly Prince Edward stopped and said apologetically: "I beg your pardon; I ought to have asked you whether you minded being De Wet, for I am afraid he's not a very nice person."

The children of the duke and duchess have a delightful surprise in store on their parents' return. Among the many magnificent gifts which have been presented to the duke and duchess, the children of Cape Colony gave for the children of their Royal Highnesses two beautiful Basuto ponies, which are now members of the royal party travelling about the world.
