

ASSASSIN'S TRIAL.

Indications that the Slayer
of McKinley

WILL KNOW HIS FATE IN VERY
SHORT ORDER.

Excellent Progress Made at
Monday's Sitting of the
Court.

Buffalo, Sept. 24.—The trial of Leon F. Czolgosz for the murder of President McKinley was resumed today with every prospect that it would be concluded with the adjournment at four o'clock, at the furthest it will not be prolonged beyond a few hours session tomorrow.

Buffalo, Sept. 24.—Leon F. Czolgosz was placed on trial yesterday morning charged with the murder of President William McKinley. He entered a plea of "guilty" which was subsequently changed to "not guilty" by direction of the court. All the events of the day tended to indicate that the trial will be short. Court convened at 10 o'clock and before two hours eight jurors had been secured.

Justice Trueman C. White, one of the oldest and most experienced of the Supreme Court justices, was on the bench. Immediately after the opening of the court and after the prisoner had pleaded, ex-Justice Loran L. Lewis, senior counsel for the defendant, announced that, together with his colleagues, former Justice C. Titus and Mr. Carlton E. Ladd, they were ready to act in behalf of the prisoner.

Before the day was over the entire panel had been sworn, and were seated in the box and had listened to a description of the Temple of Music where the alleged crime occurred, had seen photographs of the interior of that structure, and had been told by the surgeons what caused the death of the president and the result of the assassin's shot upon the various organs of the body. They had also learned why the fatal bullet had not been located. McKinley's family objected to the cutting up of his body.

The presentation of the government's case began shortly before 3 o'clock when Assistant District Attorney Haller began to address the judge. His talk consumed five minutes.

"We shall show," said he, "that, for some days prior to the shooting this defendant had premeditated the shooting of the president. He knew that on the 6th of September the president would receive the populace in the Temple of Music; that on that day he went to the exposition, got into line with the people and approached the president so that he had a weapon concealed in his hand and as the president extended his hand in kindly greeting, he fired the fatal shot."

The prisoner during the morning evinced no interest whatever in the proceedings, but, as the testimony was introduced, he paid more attention to what was said and looked at the various witnesses closely.

"He fired two shots in fact. One of them took effect in the abdomen and caused the mortal wound which resulted in the president's death. That, in brief, is the story we shall show you. Witnesses will tell you this story and I am sure that when you have heard the evidence you will have no difficulty in reaching a verdict of murder in the first degree."

It is not probable that any defense will be put in, owing to the character of the prisoner and his refusal to aid his attorneys in any way to procure evidence which they could use in his favor.

The probable duration of the trial, it is believed, can be placed at two full days.

GIFT TO THE DUCHESS.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The gift of the women of Ottawa to the Duchess of Cornwall and York—a magnificent mink and ermine cape clasped with golden maple leaves—was presented to her royal highness yesterday afternoon in the garden at Government House. Lady Laurier made the presentation, and a large number of the subscribers were present.

An address to her royal highness was read by the secretary of the presentation committee, Mrs. Cotton, while the convenor, Mrs. Thos. Ahearne, took the garment from the box and handed it to Lady Laurier.

Following is the address:

"The women of Ottawa have conferred upon us the pleasing distinction of presenting your royal highness with the accompanying gift, and desire that your

royal highness will honor them by its acceptance. This gift is a token of the loyal and affectionate regard in which your royal highness is personally held by the women of the Canadian capital, and they also wish to mark the occasion of your royal highness' first visit to the dominion by asking your royal highness' kind acceptance of something which shall be at once useful and at the same time typical of our country.

"That your royal highness may have many years of happiness, endowed with the greatest of all blessings—the blessing of Divine Providence—is the sincere prayer of the women of Ottawa."

Royal Visit to Ottawa
Brought to a Close.

DUKE AND DUCHESS RECEIVED
HEARTY SENDOFF.

His Royal Highness Extended
Thanks.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Large crowds assembled early about the route of the procession to get a last glance of the Royal Duke and Duchess who succeeded during their stay here to captivate the hearts of the citizens of the capital.

The weather was very fine as it has been during the four days of their visit.

Bright and early the troops of Ottawa brigade were astir, whilst men of C.O.D., G. T. and the R. C. D. were busy preparing for their part as escorts.

The route to Elgin street station was the same as on the day of the arrival, except that the procession turned from Wellington down Metcalf instead of Bank street.

Shortly after twelve o'clock the royal procession formed and marched to Elgin station.

When the train pulled out there was great cheering.

Previous to the departure the Duke in a few words thanked the people of Ottawa for the royal manner in which they had entertained himself and the Duchess.
