AUSTRALIA'S COMMANDANT.

Position May be Offered to Col. Hutton.

London, Sept. 23.—A despatch to The Daily Mail from Sydney, Australia, says that the delay in the appointment of the Federal Commandant is due to a difference of opinion on the question of salary between the Imperial and the Commonwealth Governments. Mr. Barton says that the Commonwealth cannot agree to pay £5,000, which is the salary understood to have been suggested by the Imperial authorities. He adds that the command, on the recommendation of Lord Roberts, was offered to Major-General Sir R. Pole-Carew, K. C. B., at a salary of £2,500. This he refused, and asked for £5,000 on the ground of the expense of entertainment. Mr. Barton, however, explains that the position involves little official entertaining.

Lord Roberts has now recommended Major-General Lord Dundonald and Major-General Sir H. J. T. Hildyard, K. C. B. The Commonwealth Government is inquiring whether either of these officers would be prepared to accept the terms if the commandantship were offered. A reply is now awaited.

In the event of both refusing, the offer will go to Col. Sir E. T. H. Hutton, K. C. M. G., Major-General Smith Dorrien, or Col. Sir Hector Macdonald, K. C. B. It is stipulated that the Commandant shall be a sympathizer with the citizen soldier movement. The local troops advocate the appointment of Col. Sir E. Hutton, formerly Commandant of New South Wales and in Canada.

When the lot goes to the capital of New Brunswick every lady will wear a Silk Dress at price of wool cashmere. Have bought also an immense lot of Chshmere Hose for ladies and gents, prices I never saw them so low. Be sure and clear out stock in hand.

From here I go to Paris, Berlin, Vienna, Constantinople, etc. I am learning how to keep shop while on this side of the world, but I think that nine out of every ten I have seen so far ought to come to the Klondike and learn a bit more. Write me to London.
