And the Recent Successful Provincial Exhibition.

EDITOR KETCHUM OF THE WOODSTOCK PRESS

Rises to Make a Few Observations.

Mr. T. C. L. Ketchum, editor of the Woodstock Press, who was in Fredericton exhibition week and kept his eyes and ears open, has this to say in the last issue of his newspaper:

"The Fredericton exhibition managing committee were an active lot of men. They advertised the affair in good shape, and they were keen in getting special rates on the railways and steamers. For instance an excursion rate from St John to Fredericton and return on Wednesday, for 50 cts, was bound to catch, and did catch hundreds. They helped fill up the city, they paid for admission to the exhibition, and they contributed a deal to making the whole affair a success. Special excursion rates from other quarters had their effect. * * *

A new exhibition building has been erected. It is not as large as the old one, but would seem quite large enough for the purpose. The exhibits were very much like those usually seen on occasions of this kind, and it must be said that the exhibitors as a general thing showed good taste in displaying their goods. The building proper is 166 feet long, broad in proportion with capacious galleries all around. * * *

Fredericton is a place where people always like to go on a visit. It is the centre of the province, the centre of government, of education and of law. Nor is it wanting in commercial importance. There is a steady and healthy growth of the city from a commercial and manufacturing standpoint. When you come to add to all this, the great natural beauty of the place, its charming location on the river, the handsome public buildings, and the pretty and well-kept private homes, the regularity of the streets, shaded with beautiful and stately trees, not yet in the ear and yellow leaf, it is little wonder that it attracts visitors from within the province, and that each succeeding summer sees an increase in the tourist travel. A little defect is particularly noticeable to the stranger. He is told to go to this or that street, but looks in vain for the name of the street on any of the corners. It is understood that the streets will be properly labelled at an early date, a convenience to the visitor, at all events.

DANGEROUSLY ILL.

Critical Condition of Rev. Principal Grant, C. M. G.

Kingston, Ont., Sept. 24.—Principal Grant has improved greatly during the past twenty-four hours, and there is strong probability that he will recover.

Kingston, September 24.—Principal Grant upon whom the King last week bestowed the honor of Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, is dangerously ill in the General Hospital here, whither he was taken Saturday afternoon. His illness prevented him from going to Ottawa to attend the investiture by the Duke of York.

Dr Grant arrived at Montreal from England on Friday night, by the steamer Lake Megantic. On the way up the Gulf of St Lawrence, he was taken with a severe chill and these came successively for three days. On Saturday evening he abandoned the proposed journey to Ottawa and has ened home. On arrival here he was helped from the train and driven home, where his physician, Dr R W Garrett, found him in a terrible chill, with fever following. He was hastily taken to the hospital and remedies applied. Dr Garrett said he suffered from a complication of diseases largely due to a previous illness affecting some of the functional organs. At one time his vitality reached such a low ebb that collapse was feared.

All Saturday afternoon and evening his condition continued extremely grave, and his physicians was alarmed as to his recovery. Sunday morning his condition was slightly improved and last evening a still further improvement was noticed. "He is still critically ill," said Dr. Garrett, "and his many friends are most anxious about him."

Awful Fate That Overtook Thos. Collette.

WHILE AT WORK IN AN ALBERT COUNTY MINE.

Lived Only an Hour After Being Exhumed.

Cleveland, Sept. 24.—The insurance policies on President McKinley's life aggregate \$315,000, according to Finance, in its issue of Saturday.

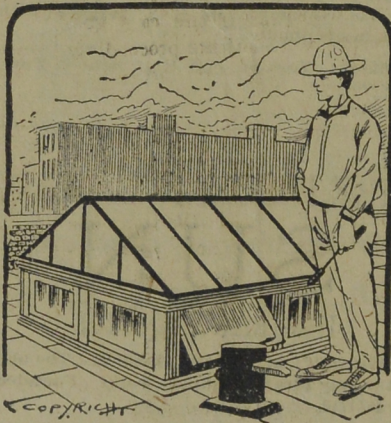

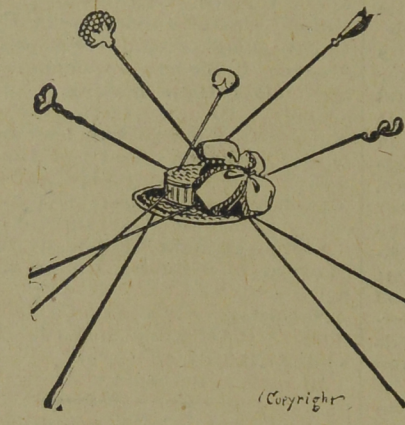
