DR. PARKIN'S GOOD WORK.

Probably no city of its size in Canada has given a greater number of her sons to the wider arena of service both public and private than Fredericton. All over the continent, the men products of this city are winning distinction in the various walks of life, enriching the places of their adoption, and reflecting credit on their former homes. The names of Hon A. G. Blair, Hon Geo E. Foster Judge E.L. Wetmore Prof. C.G.D. Roberts, Bliss Carman, Dr. George R. Parkin, J. Douglas Hazen, Rev. A. J. Mowatt, Prof. W. K. Hatt and dozens of others will readily occur to the reader in this connection, and if we are ever to have An Old Home Week in Fredericton, we shall be proud to welcome among our returning sons the men who have gone to other cities and made a name for themselves in the various walks of life.

The Herald's attention was particularly directed to this interesting matter by reference to an event which occurred last week at Toronto, the laying of the corner stone of a new preparatory school in connection with Upper Canada College, of which our former highly esteemed fellow principal, Dr. George R. Parkin, C. M. G., is the worthy principal.

The ceremony was performed by Lady Minto, who came specially from Ottawa for the service, and during the proceedings many appreciative words were spoken of Dr. Parkin for the splendid educational work he is doing in the Queen city.

The introductory address was made by Dr. Parkin, who said that the erection of the preparatory school was a part of a large plan, and he believed that in undertaking this work they were making an important advance in the purpose on which they had set their minds, namely, the establishment on a firm basis in Canada of a really great public school, which will be to this country what the famous English schools of the same type have been to our mother land. A school of this kind, with 300 boys, as we now have on our lists, with accommodation for 400 such as we shall have when this building is completed, gives the advantage of a large educational community. But all experience shows that to secure good training the large community must be broken up into separate homes with a manageable number of boys. We therefore hope to see the building of this house, which we aim at making as perfect as possible, followed by that of others to contain about forty boys each.

"By building these homes: by decreasing the number of pupils in our main college building; by gradually limiting the number of day boys; by striving in every way to make the surroundings of school life here beautiful, healthful and efficient, by aiming to make it the home of Christian teaching, we believe that we shall be building up on sound lines an institution which may have a profound influence on the future of the country. Upper Canada College has had a past of which we are proud, and especially through the patriotic services which her old boys have rendered to Canada and the empire. We hope to make for it a still larger future. What we are doing today proves that we are going through a stage of healthy development.

Hon. Geo. W. Ross in his address, said that Upper Canada College had had its dark days, but was now on a solid, promising basis. "To put it on the road to success," said Mr. Ross, "the principal and myself as minister of education, had first to cast about for a new principal. Between us we discovered Dr. Parkin, and he rediscovered Upper Canada College.

(Cheers.) I do not know whether the discoverers of Dr. Parkin or the discovered Dr. Parkin deserve the more credit. (Laughter and applause.) I congratulate you upon the success of his administration. He deserves well not only of the college but of every friend of education in Canada, and I congratulate him upon the exceptional interest he has thrown into the life of the college, and the many hundreds, the many thousands, of friends new and old whom he has quickened into promoting its interests."

Mayor Howland recalled the fact that two former students of Upper Canada college had won the Victoria Cross, Mr. Cockburn ex-M. P. and former principal of the college, congratulated Dr. Parkin on the success it has achieved under his principalship, Col. Dennison declared that the college authorities owed every possible credit to Dr. Parkin for the work he had done, and Lady Minto, in a graceful little address, said she felt very proud of being connected with this college, which has made such a name for itself already, and especially under the able guidance of Dr. Parkin. She hoped the preparatory school would be successful in every way, and that many boys will be educated here who will eventually leave their mark in the annals of Canadian history.

A HOT DISCUSSION.

Ever since the Canadian Parliament passed a resolution favoring the elimination of the objectionable clause from the coronation oath, a fierce newspaper warfare has been carried on between Rev. Father Fallon, a prominent Ottawa priest, and Hon. S. H. Blake, of Toronto. The Rev Father in his latest communication accuses Mr. Blake, who is a great moral reformer and religious enthusiast, with being a second hand dealer in clumsy forgeries. Mr. Blake who is also given to the use of very strong language, is still to be heard from. In the meantime it is announced that Father Fallon has been ordered to Buffalo, but even the boundary line will prove no barrier to the distinguished letter writers making faces at each other. If the Father and the lawyer were editors residing, say at Chatham, they could scarcely engage in a fiercer literary contest than they have waged at intervals for some weeks.

The question naturally arises, what good comes from a discussion on religious questions between men so far apart in their opinions as Father Fallon and Mr. Blake?

The Globe says that the despatch from Montreal, that hereafter the C. P. R., at Montreal would not accept freight for points on the I. C. R., is believed to be the first announcement in connection with the settlement of the dispute between the I. C. R., and C. P. R. No announcement of the reason for the new order has been received, but it is known that negotiations for a settlement of the whole difficulty were in progress, with every likelihood of a favorable termination. The new order means that the C. P. R., will not be a competitor with the I. C. R., for freight from Montreal for I. C. R. points.

Toledo, Ohio, enjoys the distinction of having organized the first church trust. The denominations retain their individuality intact, but have combined for the conducting of socials, picnics, entertainments and prayer meetings. They have also combined to make a vigorous canvass of the city for the purpose of bringing every family into connection with some church. All opposition between denominations will disappear.

The first volume of the census shows that the population of the United Kingdom, England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales is 41,434,578 an increase of 3,721,656 in ten years. England and Wales show 78.4 per cent of the increase, while Ireland shows a loss.

If we have had a long, severe winter, summer has its compensations. An Uncle Tom's Cabin Company with two Toppies, two Marks and the inevitable bloodhound is coming this way.

The Boer capture of 250 Australian troops in South Africa is one of the disagreeable incidents of the war, and altogether the situation is not pleasing to Englishmen. It is believed the Boers are gaining many recruits from the Dutch districts of Cape Colony, and in spite of Mr. Chamberlain's calm assertion that the embers of the war are only smouldering it looks, very much as if they had burst into flame.

The local government and the province are to be congratulated on the success of the Crown Land sale. The property leased today for \$13,000 comprised that for which lumbermen were said to have combined at a former sale, but which was put up again, with very satisfactory results.

The friends of Dalhousie College are very proud of the fact that Prof. McGregor of that institution, has been awarded the honorary degree of LL. D. by Glasgow University.

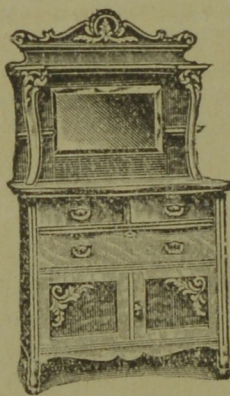
