NO GREAT CHANGE

In the C. P. R. Trackmen's Strike.

PRESIDENT McNICHOLL SAYS COMPANY IS NOT DISCOMMODED

By the Walk Out of the Men.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, June 19.—There were no new developments today in the trackmen's strike. Both sides declare themselves as confident as ever.

At the strikers' headquarters it is asserted that telegrams have been received from every point on the system stating, that men are striking today, and that there has been no wavering in the ranks.

General Manager McNicholl on the other hand asserts that there has been a perceptible increase in the number of men at work today, that several foremen have returned to work bringing some of their men with them, and that the company is in no way discommoded by the strike.

He is persistent in the prediction that the whole trouble will be over in a few days.

President Wilson left for Toronto this morning by the Grand Trunk, and will endeavor to cheer up the strikers in the west before returning to Montreal.
