

LOTS OF BUSINESS

The Mayor added the itinerary for the Royal visitors had since been made up, and Fredericton was not included. He expressed regret that Fredericton was not to be visited by the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. He thought an effort should be made by the city council, backed up by the board of trade to have government house reestablished. He suggested that the matter should be urged upon the local members for York, and also upon the government, and nothing should be left undone to have this historic old institution re-established.

Ald Everett endorsed the remarks made by the mayor.

LORD MINTO COMING.

The mayor stated that he saw by the press that the Governor General was to leave Quebec on July 10th on a tour of the provinces, and that Fredericton was included in the list of places to be visited by him. He thought that some steps should be taken to entertain him.

Ald Farrell, after a few remarks, suggested that a committee of five aldermen be appointed to act with the mayor in making arrangements to entertain His Excellency.

Ald Everett thought that the matter should be dealt with at a special meeting.

Ald Farrell's motion was carried and the mayor appointed the following as the committee, who are to meet at the call of the mayor: Aids Slipp, Farrell, Everett, Clarke and McNally.

THE EXHIBITION.

Ald Everett, brought up the question of increasing the grant to the exhibition. It was an important matter he said: deserving of the careful attention of the council. He would move that an additional grant of \$1000 be made to the agricultural society, and increased to \$1500, providing the local government gave another \$1500, the amount to come out of next year's assessment.

The motion was seconded by Ald Rossborough. On being put to the meeting it was declared lost on the following division:

Yeas—Rossborough, Everett and Merrithew—3.

Nays—Aids Farrell, McNally, Ryan, Slipp, Clarke, Moore and Vanwart—7.

Ald. Vanwart moved that the council grant another \$500 to the exhibition, and insure the buildings for \$1500, the society to pay the premium.

Ald. Farrell seconded the motion.

Ald Merrithew moved as an amendment that the grant be increased by \$1000 without any conditions as regards the government. This was seconded by Ald Rossborough.

The amendment was carried on the casting vote of the mayor, the alderman supporting it being Slipp, Rossborough, Everett, Ryan and Merrithew.

THE COW NUISANCE.

A bye law relating to the running at large of cattle was submitted by the city clerk. It provided that in future cattle be driven through the streets instead of driven.

Ald Farrell spoke against the adoption of the bye law, as he thought it would entail a hardship on butchers and others, and would be difficult of enforcement.

Ald Clark said he would be obliged to vote against it unless it included dogs.

Ald Rossborough thought that the objection of the alderman from Queens ward displayed a narrow spirit. He thought a damper should be put on boys driving cows.

Ald Moore did not approve of the bye-law and would vote against it.

Ald Everett spoke eloquently in favor of the adoption of the bye law as a means of suppressing the great and growing cow nuisance. The dog nuisance was also worthy of attention. Last year taxes were paid on only 61 dogs, whereas there were at least 500 in the city. Ald Everett informed the council that he was the owner of three cows and they did not object to being led.

Ald Rossborough reminded Ald Everett that it was unlawful to keep three cows in the city without a license. He could not support the bye-law.

Ald Everett moved that the bye-law be adopted as a whole. Ald Slipp seconded the motion.

Ald McNally moved in amendment, seconded by Ald Rossborough, that consideration be postponed for two months.

The amendment was carried by a vote of 8 to 2.

On motion of Ald Farrell it was resolved to ask the police magistrate to instruct the policemen to enforce the bye-law relating to the dumping of rubbish and paper into the streets.

Ald Everett then arose and addressed the council for about fifteen minutes on various subjects, striking out right and

left at the chairman of the several committees for not giving more careful attention to their duties. He spoke with great earnestness and those who listened to his remarks must have felt that if talk would correct the abuses of which he complained Ald Everett would be the man to straighten things out. He complained because work on the roads and streets did not commence until the middle of June and thought that the chairman of the committee was largely responsible for the state of affairs. "Why," said he, "don't they start up that old stone crusher a month or six weeks earlier, and get something done before the summer is half over?" He went on to say that visitors to the city the 24th, who went for a drive, were heard to remark afterwards, that Fredericton was a pretty city, but it had terribly rough streets. Citizens were demanding, he said, better results for the large amount annually expended on the streets, and there was no reason why the streets should not be in better condition today. If anything went wrong today in connection with street work, the chairman, if asked to explain, would lay the blame on the road-master, and if you talked to the road-master about it, he would tell you that Ald Farrell was responsible. He held that it was about time a stop was put to that sort of thing, as it was no way to do business.

The Ald next touched up the chairman of the water and city hall committees. He said that they had been only too glad to accept the positions, therefore citizens had a right to expect that they would give proper attention to their duties. The condition of the market building up to a few days ago had been a disgrace to the city, and the place was not cleaned up until he (Everett) called the mayor's attention to it. The closet in the city hall was also in a wretched condition.

At the conclusion of Ald. Everett's remarks, a motion that the council adjourn sine die was put and carried.

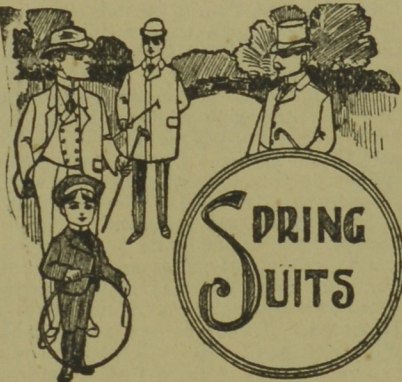
