THE TELEPHONE NEWSPAPER.

The city of Budapest enjoys probably the only telephone newspaper in the world. It has 6,200 subscribers and the company owns its own plant and has the same rights as a telephone company with regard to running its wires.

The issue of the paper, or rather of the sound, begins at 10.30 a.m., and ends at 10.30 p.m., unless some special occasion calls for the continuance of the service. The time for giving out each department of news is set forth in time-tables furnished to each subscriber, so the man who does not read the sporting or the politics has but to take off his ear-caps during that part of the programme.
