

BODY RECOVERED.

Was Found Floating in
St. John Harbor.

BELIEVED TO BE THAT OF A
MAINE MAN.

Named George Allen.

St. John, May 13.—The body of a man about fifty years old, was found floating in the harbor at one o'clock today.

It had evidently been in the water about three weeks, and was somewhat decomposed.

It is believed to be that of Gen. Allen of Maine as that name was on a card of the American Seamen's Union found in a pocket. A silver watch, gold chain, gold ring and finger watch No 18,890, Waltham make were also found on the body.

Another Chapter in the Case of the
Fredericton Couple.

Miss Mamie Hamilton, alias Kiteon, who eloped from Fredericton a couple of weeks ago with Percy Kiteon, a sergeant in the Infantry School there, left the city Saturday morning. Miss Hamilton, who is quite young, was left in the city by the young soldier and has been for some days in a quandary as to what to do. She has received letters and telegrams from her soldier friend asking her to go to Nova Scotia and become his wife, but she, through some reason, did not at first make up her mind to go with him. She was not in a position to pay her board at an uptown boarding house, and also made the remark that she did not want to go to him.

The last word from the soldier was received towards the end of last week, when he requested her to go to Nova Scotia and become his wife and that he would send her the money to bring her to him. Her boarding house acquaintances were trying to guess what she would do in the matter and they are still guessing, for on Saturday morning, the young woman left her boarding house and made her departure from the city. She was accompanied from the house by another young woman who claims that she left the city by the steamer Prince Rupert and it is thought that she has gone to Nova Scotia to join her soldier friend and become his wife. Another thing is that an unpaid board bill is left behind. Some think that the young woman returned to her home in Fredericton, but it is strongly believed that she took passage on the steamer Prince Rupert.

Bridge Collapsed.

The large bridge which crosses the Hammond River at Smithtown, Kings Co., collapsed on Saturday forenoon as a heavy boiler was being hauled across. The boiler, which belongs to a portable mill, was owned by Mr. J. Bell and was being moved on a sledge, the whole weighing four tons and a half. The bridge was considered unsafe and the horses were unhitched and taken across to the other side and a line fastened to the sledge. When the sledge was nicely on the bridge the stringers gave way and all went to the bottom. The sledge and boiler fell a distance of 20 feet to the gravel below and were only slightly injured, the former coming off with a broken wheel.
