New Brunswick Fares Well in the Supplementary Estimates

\$8,000 FOR A NEW PUBLIC BUILDING AT MARYSVILLE.

An Appropriation for Entertaining the Royal Visitors.

\$1500 FOR A NEW WHARF AT OROMOCTO—OTHER MATTERS.

Ottawa, May 10.—The supplementary estimates for the year ending June 30, 1902, presented to parliament today, give a total of \$8,369,341, of this amount \$4,332,000 is charged to consolidated fund, \$3,697,237 to capital and \$338,000 for Halifax provisional garrison.

Under the head of land and cable lines there is \$1,500 for North Sydney, Meat Cove line, and between Amherst and Grindstone Island, \$4,000.

Land and cable telegraph lines, Gulf of St Lawrence and maritime provinces, \$10,000.

There is an estimate of \$120,000 to provide for expenses and reception to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York.

There is also \$200,000 for dredging plant in the maritime provinces.

For improvements to aids to navigation and construction of lights and fog alarm stations, steam sirens, to provide for additional gas buoys in the gulf and River St. Lawrence and to improve the light at Baccaro, N. S., \$78,000.

In connection with the estimates brought down today it may be mentioned that a large number of items were re-votes.

PRICE IS \$5,000,000.

Figures in The Reputed Big Steel Deal Said to be Confirmed.

North Sydney, May 9.—The deal reported yesterday between the Nova Scotia Steel Company and a syndicate of American capitalists, as confirmed today on high official authority. The Chronicle's correspondent also learns from a thoroughly reliable source, that the syndicate with which the deal has been effected by the Canadian company, is none other than that of which J. Pierpont Morgan is the head. It is regarded as certain that the deal will be consummated at the expiration of the fortnight and that the syndicate intend to proceed at once with the erection of steel works far more extensive than those at Sydney.

The recent visits of both John F. Stairs, president of the Nova Scotia Steel Company and Premier Murray to New York were undoubtedly connected with this transaction. It is also conjectured that Morgan intends to go into steel ship-building here and will take a hand in the inauguration of a fast Atlantic service from North Sydney.

The price asked for the Nova Scotia Steel Company's property is said to be \$5,000,000, the forfeit money being \$150,000. The purchase money is divided as follows: Two million dollars for the Sydney coal mines property, \$1,000,000 for the Ferrona and Trenton iron and steel works, and \$1,000,000 for the Wabana iron areas.
