Meeting of N. B. Coal and Railway Co at St. John.

The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company met in this city Friday, and elected the following board of directors: Ernest Hutchinson, of Douglas-town, C A C Bruce of Chatham, R. A. Irving of Buctouche, A. P. Barnhill and F. Stetson of this city, and E B Winslow and W Kitchen of Fredericton. Later on the directors chose the following officers: Ernest Hutchinson president; F Stetson, vice president; Geo W Allen, M P P, of Fredericton, secretary and solicitor. This company proposes to build a railway from a point in the parish of Chipman, Queens county, to Gibson, a distance of 45 miles, and to develop the coal fields of Sunbury and Queens. One of the directors told a Sun reporter last night that the company was all right financially, and that a survey of the line would be made at once with a view to an early commencement of the construction of the railway.—St. John Sun.

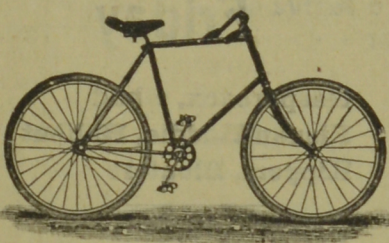

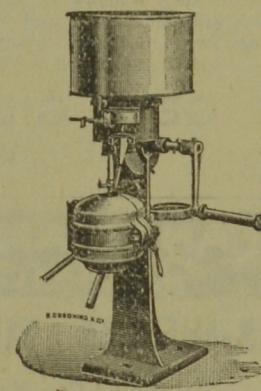
