MONTREAL CHURCH QUARREL.

Montreal, May 13.—A meeting of the vestry of Christ's Church Cathedral is called for tomorrow night, when Archdeacon Norton will read the causes assigned by Archbishop Bond why Professor Steen could not be retained at the Cathedral. Norton states that he raised no objection to Steen.

The meeting will be a stormy one. The congregation still champions the professor's cause. Resolutions will be passed censuring the Archbishop, and possibly asking for the resignation of Archdeacon Norton.

BNGAOR MAN MISSING.

He has represented the Haynes & Chalmers Co in Aroostook county for several years, and was very well known among the business people of northern Maine.

John Charlton spoke for two hours against the measure. He said a Tory government in Manitoba had passed the bill and a Tory opposition here feared to remit it.
