ANNIVERSARY SERVICE.

Interesting Exercises at the Methodist Church Yesterday.

Very interesting anniversary services in connection with the Sabbath School were held in the Methodist church yesterday. At the morning service there was special music by the children, Miss Louise Edgcombe taking a solo, and Superintendent Osborne submitted his annual report, and supplemented it with a few remarks calling the attention of the congregation to the needs of the Sabbath School.

In the afternoon the exercises were held in the lecture room and included an interesting program of music and recitations. The various officers also submitted their annual reports.

At the evening service Pastor Campbell preached on the opportunities of the twentieth century, directing his remarks principally to teachers and parents. The Jubilee Singers were in attendance and rendered valuable assistance to the choir. The impressive service was brought to a close with the singing of the National Anthem.

Laid to Rest.

The funeral of the late Alanson McNally took place from the residence of his son-in-law at Kingsclear at one o'clock Sunday afternoon, and was one of the largest seen in that section of the country for years. Among the mourners were many people from Queensbury, Macnaquac, Kingsclear and Prince William. An impressive funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. George E. Howard, of Macnaquac, assisted by Rev. Dr. Saunders of this city. The remains were inclosed in a velvet chancellor style casket, draped heavily with cobalt fringe, with silver mountings and full length extension handles. Interment was made in the rural cemetery, this city. The chief mourners were Dr. G. J. McNally, A. C. McNally, M. B. McNally, Michael McNally, Thos. H. Colter, Geo. J. Colter, Thomas Murray and G. A. Murray. Robert B. Adams was the officiating undertaker.

Dr. Colter's Condition.

Latest reports from Elgin, Albert Co., are to the effect that Post Office Inspector Colter was not as severely injured in last Thursday's railway accident as first reported, and that his removal to St. John is only a question of a few days, provided he continues to improve as rapidly as he has so far done. THE LUMBER DRIVES

Encouraging News Received from the Upper St. John.

KILBURN'S DRIVE WAS OUT OF THE BROOKS ON MAY 5TH.

Was Delayed for Two Days by Head Winds.

BUT IS NOW BELIEVED TO BE NEAR THE CORPORATION LIMITS.

The first news of an authentic nature to be received here from Kilburn's big lumber drive on the upper St. John came on Saturday in a letter from Mr. Kilburn to his wife. It was written and mailed at the depot Camp in the province of Quebec on May 5th, and gave a brief account of Mr. Kilburn's stream driving operations up to that date.

Mr. Kilburn stated in the letter that about half of his drive had started down the river, and that the balance at the time of writing was still in the lake, having been delayed for two days by a strong head wind. The logs were all out of the brooks with the exception of a few which he thought would come just as soon as the blockade in the lake could be broken. At the time of writing there was plenty of snow in the woods and Mr. Kilburn was of opinion that a rise of water would come just as soon as the weather moderated.

Local lumbermen are confident that Kilburn's drive is coming along all right, and are of opinion that a good portion of it must be in safe water long before this. They declare that Mr. Kilburn must be pretty certain of getting his drive out otherwise he would discharge his men and return home.

The first instalment of the corporation drive is now at Woodstock and seems to be coming along first rate. The recent rain storm did not extend very far up river and consequently there has been no rise of water.

Gone to Lewiston.

Tommy Howe left this morning for Lewiston under contract to play baseball with the team of that city in the New England League. They have a good one in Tommy.

The New England league season will begin on Wednesday next, when the teams will come together as follows: Lewiston at Nashua, Augusta at Lowell, Portland at Manchester and Bangor at Haverhill. For the remainder of the week the Maine teams will play in New Hampshire and then come home to open the season on Monday, May 20.
