NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Items of Interest Condensed from Herald Exchanges.

Rev. Father O'Leary has been appointed chaplain to the 8th Royal Rifles, Quebec.

Seventy per cent of the Canadian population of all ages can read; 80 per cent of the adults can write.

Sir Charles Tupper will hereafter make Vancouver his home in summer and will reside in Winnipeg in winter.

The Dominion Government proposes to appoint a second Inspector of Penitentiaries, at a salary of \$2,600 per annum.

The Harrison Line steamer Politician, Captain Chandler, cleared for Cape Town from New Orleans Saturday, with 950 horses.

It is estimated by Professor Levi that at least two-thirds of the national drink bill of the United Kingdom is expended by the working classes.

The Dominion Coal Company's last fortnight's pay at Glace Bay, Cape Breton amounted to \$100,000, the largest in its history.

The amount spent on liquor in the United Kingdom annually is equal to all the rents of all the houses and farms in Great Britain and Ireland.

R. G. Wallace, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Berlin, Ont., has received the appointment of manager at Charlottetown, P. E. I., and will shortly leave to assume charge there.

Archbishop Bond of Montreal on Saturday prohibited Rev. Mr. Steen from officiating in the diocese of Montreal. This brings the matter to a focus, and Steen will now have to appeal to the church courts.

W. T. Oliver, late Manager of the Bank of British North America in Rossland, B. C., has been appointed Manager of the same bank in Victoria, B. C., for which city he left last week, after a visit to friends in Toronto and other places.

The Shah of Persia is dying of kidney disease, says a despatch from Tiflis to the Daily Express. The malady has progressed too far to permit him to make the intended visit to Contrexville. It is expected that his death will be the signal for a Russian coup in Persia.

The commercial course agreed upon by the senate of the University of Toronto has been accepted by the Executive Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and provides for a two years' course covering such subjects as elementary chemistry and science, English, and treatment of banking, transportation, tariffs, wages, etc.

No doubt now exists as to the Boer prisoners being sent to Bermuda. The British steamer Cayo Romano which sailed from London, May 2, for New Orleans by the way of Bermuda is discharging large numbers of tents, stoves, utensils, stoves and bedding, many of the articles being marked "For Boer prisoners."

Sir Francis Knollys, private secretary to the King, says that there has been a misunderstanding in regard to the King's wish that May 24 should be observed as his birthday. He says the king suggested that Queen Victoria's birthday should be observed as usual, so as not to deprive the officials of the usual holiday. The arrangement, however, is merely a temporary one.

Agricultural returns for 1900, which have just been issued, show that the decline of British agriculture continues. The area under corn crops in Great Britain, which in 1870 occupied 9,548,000 acres, has fallen to 7,335,000 acres. The area under green crops has fallen almost as heavily, while only the acreage laid down in grass and clover shows an increase.

Mr. Aylesworth, K. C., has given his opinion on Ottawa's financial position. He holds that the city had reached the limit of its borrowing powers and that any further expenditure will be illegal. All work must be suspended until taxes can be collected to pay for it. The city borrowed \$450,000 and over \$250,000 was used for liquidating illegal overdrafts of previous years.

Enquiry in official and diplomatic circles indicates the practical certainty

that France will grant a subsidy to the proposed direct steamship line between France and Canada. This subsidy will be similar to the one voted by the Canadian Parliament. This idea is warmly welcomed at Paris.

The unfortunate case of Mrs. Elizabeth A. Narramore, who killed her six children at Barre, Mass., March 21, came up once more last week. Mrs. Narramore was formerly Miss Craig of Chamcook, Charlotte county, N. B., and lived for some time at St. Andrews. The grand jury of Worcester county reported on Wednesday, and among the true bills was one against Mrs. Narramore, alleging murder. Her case will be called for trial probably at an early date, but it is thought she will be declared not guilty by reason of insanity. The woman is recovering, and is said to be now in her right senses.

Orders have been received at Toronto within the last few days by A. P. Westervelt, Secretary of the Ontario Live Stock Association, for \$17,000 worth of thoroughbred stock, to be shipped to the Northwest Territories and British Columbia. They will consist chiefly of heavy horses, Yorkshire and Shorthorn cattle and Yorkshire and Berkshire pigs. Geo. C. Creelman, Superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, spent last week in South Ontario buying for these orders, and in one case paid \$800 for a horse for British Columbia.

Charles A. E. Harris, the well-known musical composer of Kingston, Ont., is out with a scheme to develop Canada's musical resources. He will form classes in all the leading cities during the winter, and these will study and rehearse ancient and modern works. In the spring, with soloists, orchestra and all the accessories for a musical festival, Mr. Harris will move from place to place, giving concerts, the choruses being rendered by the local talent. Mr. Harris thinks his scheme will develop thousands of young singers, and if he succeeds in this alone, he believes he will be amply repaid. The plan is in preparation for next season.

A remarkable operation was performed in the Protestant Hospital at Ottawa last week, intended to cure lock jaw. John Tocher, of Arnprior, had both hands blown off in a dynamite explosion and he was brought to the hospital. Lock jaw set in Tuesday night and on Wednesday Tocher's skull was opened over the motor arteries and the serum was injected. Tocher is in a low condition and may not recover. DRANK POISON

After Fencing His Boy to Swallow Some.

FEARFUL TRAGEDY BREAKS UP A FAMILY AT PELHAM, N. Y.

New York, May 20.—After playing hide and go seek with his little son Charlie, a toddler of 5, John L. Haigh forced the child to drink a solution of cyanide of potassium last night. Then he drank some of the poison himself, and died holding the boy in his arms.

Mrs. Haigh discovered them as they lay on the floor in her husband's room in their pretty cottage home at Pelham, not five minutes after the tragedy. She saw that Charlie still breathed, and snatching him from the clasping arms of his father, she tried to bring him back to life by forcing milk down his throat. It was a vain effort, for the boy died in a few minutes. He was gasping his last when Dr. Van Patten of Mt. Vernon, who had been summoned, started for the house.

Why Haigh committed the double deed that hurried child and himself into eternity, Mrs. Haigh declared, despairingly, she did not know.

Mr. Haigh was only 26 years old. His wife, a beautiful woman, is two years younger. Besides Charlie they had another child, a boy of 8 months.

Mrs. Haigh held the baby close to her breast last night and gazed with grief too deep for tears at the forms of her dead husband and eldest born. Her husband was an expert accountant and bookkeeper. He came home last night in his usual good humor. Mrs. Haigh does not know that he had ever speculated or was in any monetary difficulty.

SOCIETY SHOCKED.

Fashionable Woman an Alleged Forger.

MRS A M WEAVER OF ROCHESTER, N. Y. UNDER ARREST.

Is Accused of Obtaining Thousands of Dollars.

Rochester, N. Y., May 20.—A sensation was caused in Rochester's exclusive society circles yesterday by the arrest of Mrs. Alice M. Weaver, wife of Simon J. Weaver, head of the firm of Weaver, Palmer & Richmond, leading hardware merchants, on a charge of forgery.

Mrs. Weaver, a handsome brunette, 35 years of age, is charged with forging the name of Martin Davis of Baker, Davis & Baker, lawyers, as an indorsement to a note of \$1200. She was taken to the district attorney's office in a cab, where she gave bail in the sum of \$1000, her mother going on her bond.

The case has thoroughly puzzled the authorities, and the closest friends of Mr. and Mrs. Weaver. Another announcement that comes with the arrest is that Mr. Weaver has sued his wife for a legal separation.

The Weavers have been prominent socially. Mrs. Weaver's mother is Harriet M. Wells. She formerly lived in Warren, Penn., her husband being a member of the firm of Struthers, Wells & Co. of that city.

Mr. Davis has known the family for many years. He had indorsed several notes for Mrs. Weaver. Last October Mr. Davis happened to be in the Commercial bank and asked about Mrs. Weaver's affairs. Some remarks were passed that prompted Thomas J. Swanton, the cashier of the bank, to ask Mr. Davis if he had indorsed a \$1200 note which he had in the bank, and which bore Mr. Davis' signature.

"I certainly did not," replied Mr. Davis, much surprised.

It was agreed that Mr. Weaver should be sent for. Mr. Weaver was asked to put his name on the \$1200 note. He declined to do so, but said he would send for Mrs. Weaver and ask her to make an explanation. She was telephoned to, and answered that she would be down in a few days to take up the note, but failed to keep her promise.

It was learned later that Mrs. Weaver had forged Mr. Davis' name on another note for \$5,000, and the names of Mrs. Wells and Mr. Weaver on notes for \$1,000 and \$1,500. She had obtained the cash on these notes and disposed of it, nobody knew how.

Mr. Weaver refused to shield his wife, and they soon parted company. Efforts have been made to obtain settlements through Mrs. Weaver's mother, and in case a satisfactory adjustment can be obtained the criminal prosecution may be dropped.
