

A RICH TREAT

Was the Spectacular Production of
Evangeline at the Opera House.

Few people there are in this locality who have not read of the expulsion of the Acadians from Nova Scotia and the romance of Evangeline, as set forth in verse by the immortal Longfellow, therefore the spectacular production of the piece at the Opera House last evening by local talent under the direction of Mr and Mrs L J Rodenbough of Boston was naturally looked forward to with great interest. The Opera House was comfortably filled with a select and very appreciative audience, and the most sanguine expectations formed in regard to the entertainment were more than realized.

The pathetic story of Evangeline was recited by Mrs. Rodenbough, who is an eloquent of marked ability, and was illustrated by moving tableaux of a most realistic nature. Nearly one hundred young ladies and gentlemen belonging to the city, and appropriately costumed for the occasion, took part, and acquitted themselves remarkably well, considering the short time allowed them for training. Miss Winslow as Evangeline acted the part of the true heroine, and had the sympathy of the audience all through the piece. Mr March as Basil the blacksmith was a great success, and his vocal selections were greatly appreciated. Mr Campbell as Benedict seemed to be right at home, and his artistic make-up and fine stage presence were greatly admired. J A Winslow as Rene, the notary, seemed to be right in his element and was applauded at every appearance. Mr E C Smith in the role of Gabriel, Evangeline's lover, seemed to be perfectly at ease and his difficult part was well executed. W. A. Walsh as the parish priest was a conspicuous figure in the tableaux and did himself credit. The other characters were all well personated and the costumes worn were of an appropriate nature.

There were fourteen tableaux, illustrating most striking scenes in connection with the exile of the Acadians, and all were well received by the audience. Among the most enjoyable of the scenes was the peasant dance taken part in by twelve young ladies and gentlemen. The pace was a very fast one but all proved themselves equal to the occasion. Fiddler Babbitt, from his position on the table, kept time with a squeaky violin, and added not a little to the realism and humor of the situation.

A most pleasing feature of the entertainment was the minuet dance taken part in by eight prettily costumed young ladies. They acquitted themselves in a highly creditable manner, and were compelled to respond to an encore. HUNG UP BY A DENTIST.

Son of the Late Senator Lewin Jailed at Toronto.

Toronto, May 21.—Application was made at Osgoode hall yesterday by Barrister D. O. Cameron for the release of J D Lewin, son of the late Senator Lewin of St. John, N.B., who is in Toronto jail on a capias on a judgment for \$2,250, held by F D Andrews, dentist, of this city, who has a claim on an award against Lewin for the above amount in connection with various dealings. Lewin was arrested May 7th on the return from a trip to Mexico, made in connection with certain Mexican government mining concessions. Cameron claimed Lewin was in jail wrongfully, and moved for his discharge. Chief Justice Meredith adjourned the motion for a week at the request of Andrews' counsel, and Lewin remains in limbo.
