A plumber was sent for to the house of a wealthy stockbroker to execute some repairs.

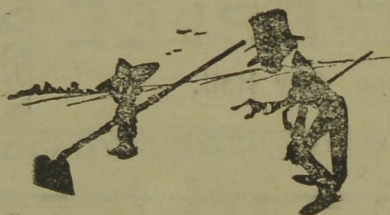
He was taken by the butler into the dining room and was beginning his work when the lady of the house entered.
