A DAMNABLE CRIME.

The attempted assassination of President McKinley, has shocked the entire civilized world, and adds another to the long list of crimes against the rulers of great nations. At the present writing the President's life is hanging in the balance, and any moment may bring news that he has passed away.

The shooting appears to have been by an Anarchist who was probably selected for the purpose by his fellow conspirators. No punishment is too severe for the man who sought and possibly may yet obtain the life of an innocent and respected man, a statesman who has given wise and progressive government to his country, a courteous Christian gentleman whose ambition has been to serve his fellow men, and lead the great American nation to a great destiny.

The time and manner of the shooting was cowardly in the extreme. The president was receiving his admirers at the Buffalo exhibition, and the would be assassin approached Mr McKinley with outstretched hand in the guise of a friend, while in the other he held the revolver intended to deal a death blow at the head of the nation.

The president's calmness and bravery when he realized what had befallen him must be admired, and revealed great characteristics which with many others have made him the idol of his fellow countrymen.

Let us hope that medical science and surgical skill may avert a fatal termination to Mr. McKinley's wounds, and that he may be spared to serve his country in the exalted position which he has attained by the exercise of great ability, honesty and perseverance.

All Canadians will join with their kinsmen across the border in a feeling of horror at the crime, in sympathy for the wounded president, and in the hope that he may speedily recover. In the meantime the world awaits with intense anxiety the outcome of Mr McKinley's courageous struggle for life, and condemns in unmeasured terms the fiendish brutality that prompted the attack on the life of the chief magistrate.

The lesson which the American people have to learn from the attempted assassination is that the blatant Anarchists who are permitted practically free speech, must be suppressed at all hazards. Their representatives have murdered President Carnot of France, the Empress of Austria, and the King of Italy, and only the intervention of a merciful providence will save the life of President McKinley.

May He who always rules wisely and well, watch tenderly over the wounded president, and restore him to strength and usefulness.

If President McKinley dies as a result of his wounds, he will be the third martyred president of the United States within the comparatively short period of thirty-six years. In a theatre at Washington on the night of April 14, 1865, Abraham Lincoln was murdered by the bullet of Wilkes Booth, and at a railway station in the same city July 2, 1881, Jas. A. Garfield was shot down by the maniac Guiteau, and died Sept. 19.
