NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Items of Interest Condensed from Herald Exchanges.

St. Peter's Church, Toronto, has given Ven. Archdeacon Boddy a retiring allowance of \$1,500 a year.

Lord Salisbury, bronzed, and looking extremely well, has returned to England from Beaulieu, in the South of France.

The Indian population of Canada was 99,010 in 1900, according to the report of the department of Indian affairs.

Frederick H Dillingham, one of Bangor's oldest residents and for years a well known figure in the business life of that city, died at his home on Essex street Saturday morning at the age of 91 years.

The privy council has granted the attorney general of Manitoba leave to appeal from the decision of the king's bench court of Manitoba in ruling that the provincial legislature has no power to pass a liquor act.

Lieut Col Bulman, of the 79th regiment, Quebec, has written to Ottawa for permission to wear straw hats in camp at Montreal. In the event of permission being granted, the straw hats will be purchased for the rank and file by the captains.

An electric storm swept over Delaware, Ohio, Friday night. Lightning struck the Second Baptist Church, tearing off the roof and setting the structure on fire, doing much damage, and injuring three persons.

Cable messages from Ottawa to India, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and Hong Kong, range from \$1.23 to \$1.60 per word, including address and signature. The rates will be greatly reduced when the Pacific cable is completed.

The steamship Lake Superior, due at Quebec Friday, is quarantined at Groses Isle for twenty-one days owing to a case of smallpox being discovered on board.

Her crew and over seven hundred second-class and steerage passengers were landed on the island Saturday.

Miss Geneva Jackson, of Brockville, has resigned as a matron of the Helping Hand Association Hospital at Peeskil, N. Y., because of articles in the Peeskil papers which criticized the hospital management quite severely for allowing the employment of Canadian girls as nurses, to the exclusion of Americans—especially Peeskil girls.

A curious accident occurred Friday to the Strasbourg express, by which a woman was killed and several other persons were injured. Owing to the air-brakes failing to work, the train dashed through the station wall, crossed a street, thirty yards wide, ploughed through a freight train on the bar or siding, and went over an embankment into the harbor.

Of 26 young people who started from College Point, L. I., Saturday night on what is locally known as a "Starlight" ride, two were carried home Sunday morning dead, five are in the Jamaica Hospital, four were allowed to leave the hospital, after having their wounds dressed, and everyone of the remainder was more or less bruised. A collision with a trolley car caused the accident.

NEW RULES FOR KITCHEN.

Ten Hours a Day, \$3.00 a Week Wages and all Nights Out.

Wilkes' arre, May 13.—"Mother" Jones is preparing to organize a servant girls' union here as well as in Scranton, and has drawn up these rules, which the union will enforce at each "place."

Ten hours' work a day and no more. An increase in wages according to the size of the house and the work required. No one shall work for less than \$3 a week.

Cooks shall not act as ladies' maids or take care of babies.

Nurse girls shall not be required to act as cooks.

It shall not be necessary to stay in nights while the mistress goes out.

If more than ten hours work a day shall be required a double shift must be employed.

An amusement room shall be furnished for the girls so that they shall not be required to sit in the kitchen all the time.

Visitors shall be allowed to call upon them any night they are off duty.

Wages must be paid every week.

They shall have the privilege of putting their clothes in the family wash.

Their meals shall be the same as those of the family.

Bed chambers shall be large, airy and well heated.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Three Ontario Churches Suffer—One Man Killed.

Bradford, Ont., May 13.—Yesterday afternoon a severe gale, accompanied by lightning, passed over this section. In Bond Head, the spire of the English church was thrown down and the church otherwise damaged. The Presbyterian church was also damaged by lightning.

Two young men named Grant and Robbins were standing in the porch of this church when the lightning passed through the belfry into the porch. Grant was instantly killed and Robbins badly stunned, but not seriously injured. Grant was about 20 years of age, son of Hector Grant, farmer of West Gwillimburg.

Berlin, Ont., May 13.—Lightning struck the top of the steeple of the Lutheran church at 1.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, setting it on fire. The blaze was out of reach of the firemen until it crept to the main structure and was got under control only at midnight.
