

WILL LAND AT QUEBEC.

Halifax People Disappointed that they will not be the First to Greet Royal Visitors.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Halifax, N. S., May 14.—Governor Jones received word yesterday that the Duke of Cornwall and York would not make his first landing on the American continent at Halifax, but that he would land at Quebec instead on the date proposed for Halifax—Sept. 15th. The duke and his party will make Halifax their point of departure, either for New York or Europe, as may later be determined. The reason assigned for this change in the itinerary is that the royal party think it better to get their western trip over before the weather becomes too cool. The chief reason, however, is that the departure from Quebec so late in the season would subject them to a voyage through the Gulf of St. Lawrence when navigation has become less pleasant than it will be in September.

This change is very disappointing to Halifax people, who were planning on having the Duke of Cornwall and York open his bill of fare in this city.

SALISBURY'S STRONG WORDS.

Probable Result if Ireland Had Secured Home Rule.

London, May 14.—Lord Salisbury made a rather startling speech last night. He lamented the sacrifice Britain had been called upon to make in South Africa. The country's display of power would dissipate the notion that Britain's star had set, that she would never fight again but would yield to pressure of any adversary. Every power in the world knows today that England is one of the most formidable enemies that could be encountered.

Referring to Home Rule for Ireland, Lord Salisbury said that the British had been taught a lesson by the war in South Africa. If the Home Rule bill had been successful in 1893 and an Irish government had been established at Dublin, England would have had to meet a hostile Ireland, as hostile as the Transvaal. To grant Home Rule would be to invite another task of conquering Ireland.

New York, May 14.—A cable to an evening paper from Dublin, quotes Maude Gonne, the Irish Joan of Arc, with saying that Ireland will rise as a result of Salisbury's speech.

SCHOOL OF MANUAL TRAINING.

St. John to Have one for a Couple of Months.

A meeting to consider the matter of holding the summer school of manual training for the province in St. John during July and August next, was held at the Royal hotel, St. John, yesterday. It was attended by Prof. Robertson, Judge Trueman, chairman of the St. John school board; Inspector Carter, Dr. Bridges and Principal MacCreedy of the manual training school at Fredericton.

Prof. Robinson offered to bring the school to St. John if the school board will provide a suitable room. Judge Trueman will bring the matter before the board at once and if the decision is favorable, a meeting of the teachers of the city and vicinity will be called at an early date.

Principal MacCreedy will be able to provide forty work branches and looks for a large class if the school is located here.

Subsequently at a meeting of the St. John school board the chairman reported the offer from the educational authorities at Fredericton to furnish all appliances necessary to carry on the Sloyd system for a month in St. John for the use of the teachers, and it was decided to furnish quarters in the Centennial school building.
