St. Andrew's Society.

The regular meeting of the Fredericton Society of St Andrew was held at the Queen Hotel last evening. President McMurray was in the chair, but the attendance of members was not large. As far as can be learned only business of a routine nature was transacted. Four applications for the society's scholarship to the University, which becomes vacant next fall, were submitted to the meeting but no action was taken.

Shipping Notes.

The schooner Progress is at Morrison's Mill loading shingles for the American market.

GOING TO HALIFAX.

Fredericton will be Represented at the Firemen's Tournament.

At a meeting of the members of the Fredericton fire department in the Central Hose station last evening, it was decided to accept the invitation from the Halifax department to take part in the firemen's tournament to be held in that city on August 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th.

The delegation to go from here will probably number from twenty to twenty-five firemen, and they will be prepared to take part in the sports to be carried out during the four days.

A committee composed of Chief Lipsett, Assistant Chief Rutter and the other officers of the department, was appointed to take the affair in hand and arrange all details. Thos C Doherty was chosen to act as corresponding secretary to the committee.

The Fredericton firemen took part in a tournament at Charlottetown some years ago and acquitted themselves well, and there is no reason why they should not make a good showing at Halifax.

A HEROIC RESCUE.

A Millman Carried Through the Sluice at Grand Falls, Rescued by David Collins.

While working on the run at Burgess's mill, Grand Falls, on Friday, a man lost his footing and falling into the water was carried through the sluice. The man was being swiftly carried towards the falls, ropes, boards, etc., being thrown to him by the mill crew who ran along the bank following the imperiled man. When it seemed that all possibility of rescue were passed, David Collins, a citizen of St John, now in the employ of Burgess & Co., plunged into the boiling water and succeeded after a hard struggle in getting the man into an eddy where willing hands drew them ashore. Both men were much exhausted.
