## THE DUKE'S GREAT GRANDFATHER.

An aged newspaper clipping, now re-published, describes the manner in which the late Duke of Kent, great grandfather of the Duke of York, made a journey through Ontario, and it was very different from the manner in which the great grandson will make the trip.

A covered barge was sent from Kingston to meet the Duke and his staff, at Edwardsburg, and it lay just opposite Col. William Fraser's place for two days while the Duke was making the journey from Montreal in boats. When the Royal party arrived at Edwardsburg the Duke decided he would go and visit Col. Thomas Fraser, a brother of the Col. William above mentioned, and so they walked to that gentleman's residence, a distance of four miles. Here the Duke must have found things very pleasant for he stopped twelve days, and he took such a fancy to the eldest son of Col William Fraser that on leaving he begged Mrs. Fraser, who had seven other sons, to give him Thomas. But the lady refused to part with her first born. 'Well,' said the Duke, 'take my word for it, I will have him at some future time.' After a few years he made good his promise by sending Thomas a lieutenant's commission, with orders to join his regiment, the 60th, which was then in the West Indies, commanded by Col Gordon. Mrs McQueen, who lives with her son-in-law, Mr George Lowe, at the lower end of Metcalfe St., Toronto, is a daughter of Col Thomas Fraser, with whom the Duke of Kent stopped at Edwardsburg, and she still has in her possession the feather bed on which H.R.H. slept while he was her father's guest.

From Quebec to Vancouver and back to Halifax, the Duke of York and his party will be whirled on a specially constructed railway train, more palatial in its appointments than any he has ever seen before.

## MR CHAMBERLAIN'S PLANS.

Mr Ford in a cable letter from London, says that Mr Chamberlain is planning a new scheme for stimulating the affection, of the loyal colonists. As the King will be crowned with a new Imperial title, the presence of representative men from the colonies will be indispensable at the coronation. He is hoping to secure the attendance of the Premiers of all the self-governing colonies, and to have on parade contingents of the auxiliary troops which have been fighting the battles of the empire. The scheme has not been worked out in detail, but Mr Chamberlain is alive to the necessity of converting the coronation into a splendid Imperial fête.

At the Queen's Jubilee in 1897 Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the leading figure after Her Majesty, and if he should represent Canada at the King's coronation, no doubt a similar hearty reception will await him. Canada has done considerable for the Empire since 1897, and the old folks at home have not forgotten it. The only thing that Canada has to fear is that in the Old Land they may take a notion to purloin Sir Wilfrid from this country—keep him there in some high office of state.

Fredericton students led the province in the U. N. B. matriculating examinations. Only three students secured places in the first division and all hail from the Fredericton High School. When the principal can do such excellent work in his profession, it is a pity for him to dabble in party politics.

In P. E. Island fifty years ago, the politicians did not always settle their differences with their tongues. In the Toronto Globe of June 23, 1851, appears the following despatch from Charlotte-town: "On Saturday evening, 21st June, at half-past 8 o'clock, a duel was fought on the Government House grounds by ex-Hon Mr Palmer and Hon George Coles. The latter received the fire of the former, and fired his pistol in the air." A duel that was fought between two prominent Frederictonians at an earlier date, was more disastrous, one of the parties being shot dead, out on Maryland hill.

A provincial prohibition law is in force at Charlottetown, but the Guardian of that city says: "The effusive loyalty and excitement attendant upon welcoming the Vice-regal party, with the large number of visitors in town, resulted in a regrettable amount of drunkenness in the city Saturday afternoon and evening. On no day since the prohibitory law came into force has there been public evidence of so much drinking."

The Herald is not talking much politics this week. The citizens of Fredericton are preparing for a loyal non-political welcome to the Governor General, and politics must take a rest for a few days. After that—well we shall try and make it pretty warm for the faction candidate.

At Chatham the Governor General and his party wore travelling suits at the civic reception, while the town fathers were rigged out in frock coats and silk hats. Our city fathers will risk the frock coats and cutaways.

Stamps to the value of £5,000 were required to make the deed of gift by which Mr. Carnegie endows Scottish universities a legal document. This is the largest amount ever paid in the form of stamp duty to the British treasury.

The Duke of York is not coming to Fredericton. You can put that down for a certainty. The Ophir could never cross the Oromocto shoals. Anyhow we are going to have an exhibition.

Those old beavers that the aldermen have been wearing at funerals will never do for the vice-regal reception.

Sorry that we shall be unable to lunch with the Mintos on Tuesday, the journalistic profession is so exacting.

A meeting of the sub-committee was held immediately after the general meeting, and the following was decided upon as the route to be taken by their Excellencies on the drive about the city: In York street to Queen, down Queen to Church, out Church to Charlotte, down Charlotte to College road, out College road to the University, in College road to Lansdowne street, down Lansdowne to Waterloo Row, up Waterloo Row, to Brunswick street, up Brunswick street to old government house, thence through Wilmot Park, and out to Smythe street by the Charlotte street extension, in Smythe to George, down George to Westmorland, in Westmorland to Queen, and thence to the Queen hotel.

It is to be hoped that people residing along the proposed route of the procession will decorate their houses and endeavor to make their premises look as attractive as possible.

It is to be hoped that the road committee of the city council will bestir themselves, and have the streets through which the vice-regal party are to pass cleaned up and made to look attractive. All surplus grass should be removed from the roadsides, and unsightly bridges repaired and a little effort put forth to have the streets properly cleaned.

It is quite likely that the 71st band will be engaged to play during the luncheon at the Queen Hotel and also while the reception is going on in the parliament building.

Mayor Crockett has been notified in answer to an enquiry made by him, that His Excellency will be pleased to receive an address from the civic corporation while here.

In addition to the Mayor of Marysville the committee have decided to invite the members of the government committee to meet the vice-regal party at the train, and join in the drive about the city.
