CIRCUS TRAIN WRECKED.

Mount Vernon, N. Y., July 24.—The Walter L. Main circus was wrecked here this morning. The residents were awakened at four o'clock by the trumpeting of elephants and the roaring of lions. As the circus train, consisting of twenty-five cars, drew into the city the locomotive was thrown from the tracks by a misplaced switch. This caused four of the foremost cars to leave the rails. A half-dozen canvasmen who were asleep under the wagons were shaken up and bruised, four ring horses were hurt and two cages containing monkeys and porcupines were upset. The larger animals set up a series of cries and it took the keepers half an hour to quiet them.

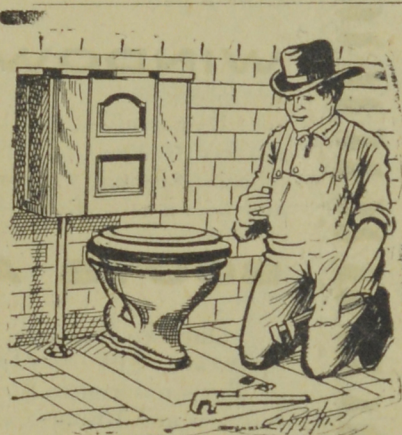
