Death at Sussex.

R. D. Robinson, late editor of the Sussex Record, died there Tuesday, aged 67. Deceased was a native of Elgin, Albert county.

Fire at Blissville.

John Patterson's house at Blissville, Sunbury county, was totally destroyed by fire Monday. Chas Patterson, while attempting to save some of the household goods, was severely burned.

A New Rector.

Rev. G. R. E. Macdonald who was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Kingston, at Bathurst, Sunday, has been appointed rector of Southampton, and will take up his residence at Temperance Vale, Sept. 1.

On a Bicycle Trip.

Death at St Marys.

Mrs Mary Ann Stead, widow of the late Matthew Stead, died at the home of her son-in-law, Isaac Peabody, St Marys, at an early hour this morning, aged 85 years. She was a native of St. John and the remains will be taken to that city for interment by the ten o'clock train on Friday morning. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

Y. M. C. A. Boys' Camp.

The annual boys' camp under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. was inaugurated at Robertson's Point, Grand Lake, today. Among those from this city who are attending are Harold Walker, Orland Kitchen, John Vrazenburg, Archie Shanks and Jack Chase. Dr. Barbour, J. T. Wilson, Joe Mills and John Brittain went along as leaders. Ten boys from Woodstock are expected to join the party.

Gibson And Chipman Ry.

The work of making the survey for the proposed railway from Chipman to Gibson is being prosecuted with the utmost despatch. E. G. Evans is in charge of the survey, and has as an assistant H. M. Balkam. The plans and specifications of the first 15 miles from Chipman are now practically completed, and tenders for the construction of this section will be asked about August 1.

GRAND ORANGE LODGE.

Annual Session Opened at Toronto

Toronto, July 24.—The Grand Orange Lodge of British America opened its session here yesterday afternoon. The grand secretary's report showed a large increase in the order during the year, especially in Manitoba and the west. Thirty-one new lodges joined. The total number

under the grand lodge is now over ninety thousand. In his address Grand Master Clarke Wallace, referring to the coronation oath, said every brother was proud of the position of the members of parliament who opposed the Costigan resolution. While a large majority of the members voted for the resolution, they do not represent the view of the Orange Association, who expect that the succession to the throne of the empire will be Protestant, and that our ruler will still continue to be a defender of the Protestant faith.

The Black Knights of the Orange order yesterday morning elected John C. Gass, Shubenacadie, N.S., grand master, and James Kelly, St. John, N.B., grand marshal.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH.

A Former Queens County Man Called Away.

George Perkins passed away quite unexpectedly at the home of James Smith, Charlotte street, last evening. He was taken ill during the forenoon, and though everything possible was done for him, continued to grow worse, and at ten o'clock in the evening, breathed his last. Heart failure was the cause of his demise. The deceased was 64 years of age, and is survived by a family of two sons and two daughters. He at one time had charge of a woodboat and was well and favorably known along the river. The remains will be taken to Queens county of interment, by boat tomorrow morning. Geo. W. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

Supt Osborne to Take a Trip Over the Road.

James Osborne, superintendent of the Atlantic Division of the C. P. R. will arrive here this evening, and tomorrow morning in company with Alex Gibson, and Superintendent Hoben, will make a trip over the Canada Eastern railway by special train. J. N. Sutherland, general freight agent of the C. P. R. will also be a member of the party, and Messrs C. Fred Chestnut, Fred B. Edgecombe and John Palmer of the city have been invited to make the trip. It is understood that the only object Supt Osborne has in going over the road is to familiarize himself with it and see the country at the same time.

The route was from the Victoria Hospital to Springhill and return and George Chappell was the only other competitor. The silver cup offered as a prize by the Canada Cycle and Motor Company was won by Langille and was presented to him after the race by Dow Vandine. The pipe offered as a second prize was won by Chappell. Langille scored 15 points, Chappell 12, and Brock Allen 5 for the six races.

LORD MINTO'S VISIT.

Program for the Reception
Approved of by Citizens' Committee.

SUB-COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO ARRANGE THE DETAILS.

The Route to be Taken by the
Vice-Regal Party.

CITIZENS INVITED TO CO-OPERATE IN WELCOMING THEIR EXCELLENCIES.

The meeting of the citizen's committee in the city council chamber yesterday afternoon to perfect arrangements for a reception to Lord and Lady Minto, was attended by the following gentlemen: His Worship Mayor Crocket in the chair, Secretary Sampson, F. S. Hilgard, Lieut. Col. Dunbar, T. H. Colter, J. J. Weddall, C. E. A. Simonds, C. H. Hatt, F. B. Edgecombe, Ald. Farrell, Chief Lipsett, Ald. Ryan, Ald. Roseborough, Ald. McNally, Ald. Everett and others.

After calling the meeting to order His Worship outlined the program arranged at a meeting with members of the local government on the previous evening, and read a letter from the Governor General's secretary, already published in these columns.

Postmaster Hilyard thought that as His Excellency was only to remain in Fredericton one half day, there did not remain a great deal of work for the committee to do. He suggested that he matter be left in the hands of the council and a sub-committee from the citizens committee appointed at the last meeting.

Mr. Diblee was very sorry that Their Excellencies were only to remain in Fredericton for five hours.

The mayor explained that it was no fault of the people of Fredericton that the change had been made, and even if the stay was to be short it behooved the citizens to take hold and make the reception one worthy of the representative of His Majesty.

Mr. Sampson thought it might be a good plan to ask the citizens to decorate their dwellings and places of business.

Ald. Farrell thought it would be a good idea to have a sub-committee of citizens act with the council in perfecting arrangements for the reception. He moved that a committee of five citizens be appointed to act with the mayor and committee of the council.

Mr. Diblee thought that the whole matter should be left in the hands of the council.

Col. Dunbar explained in answer to a question, that the R. C. R. I was to furnish the guard of honor, and the 71st regiment the band.

After some further discussion Ald. Farrell's motion was adopted and the Mayor appointed Messrs Hilyard, Diblee, Dunbar, Barry and Edgecombe as the sub-committee.

A motion by Mr. Weddall that the Mayor of Marysville be invited to meet his excellency at the train with the committee, was carried after some discussion.

Ald. McNally thought the Warden of the county should also be invited, but the suggestion was not favorably received by the meeting.
