QUEBEC'S LOYALTY.

The University of Toronto did a graceful act in conferring the honorary degree of LL. D. on Dr. Frechette, the distinguished French Canadian author, an honor well deserved and likely to lead to a better feeling between the people of the two upper provinces.

Dr. Frechette while in Toronto spoke to a press reporter on the matter of Quebec's loyalty to Britain and to the institutions of the country, and his words are worth repeating, especially in this vicinity where mischievous politicians have sought to build themselves up by disparaging everything French Canadian.

Dr. Frechette says that devotion to British institutions has spread to a very great extent, and he instanced the case of Mr. Bourassa who stands alone in his attitude assumed in Parliament. "We live happily" declares Dr. Frechette "our rights are recognized by everybody, and I do not believe any change would be to our advantage. There is a much more harmonious feeling spreading among us. Of course, there are young people, newspapers run by young fellows, boys most of them, who think it proper to say 'We will stand around the bulwark' and all those great words, but all the wise people of the Province of Quebec are perfectly satisfied with the present position. The fact is that the English people are showing themselves very generous and very liberal in supporting one of us as Prime Minister. That is a most eloquent proof of their spirit of liberalism towards us, and we are not overlooked."

"As to our sentiments for France, they are quite natural. Supposing the positions were interchanged, the English would, of course keep a sacred remembrance of their old country, and respect and revere the flag of their old country as we do the flag of France; but when we unfurl the French flag in the Province of Quebec it has not the slightest political meaning, it has no political significance whatever, it is regarded only as an emblem of our race. We respect it and we like it, but if the day should come when it would be interpreted as disloyalty you would not see one hoist it in the Province of Quebec. If we hoist that flag with pride, it is at the same time with gratitude to the spirit of liberalism with which the English portion of the community acquiesces in that inoffensive display, and I think it will be a glory to England to have succeeded in conquering this great country and conquering the devotion of a whole race without an hour having to renounce any of his national feelings and traditions."

THE GROWTH OF PRESBYTERIANISM.

The general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada, which made up of delegates of conference from all over the Dominion, is in session at Ottawa, with nearly five hundred clergymen and elders in attendance. The sessions will continue for seven days and are of great interest to members of that faith.

Rev. Dr. Warlen general agent of the church in the West has been elected by unanimous election as moderator or presiding officer, and in his address of thanks, called attention to the great growth of Presbyterianism in Canada. When the last century opened there were only twelve Presbyterian clergymen and a Presbyterian population of thirty thousand. The present century opened with 1,300 ministers in active service and a Presbyterian population of 850,000. He spoke of a great develop-

ment of the country and the growing population of Manitoba and the west, showing an era of unparalleled prosperity. Two years ago the church had devoted itself to raise \$1,000,000. It was gratifying to know that \$1,400,000 had been subscribed instead of \$1,000,000. Instead of \$400,000 debts on church property there had been subscribed upwards of \$800,000. There was \$400,000 paid in cash out of \$560,000 subscribed for the other portion of the fund, and in a few months before it was closed \$600,000 would have been raised.

ONTARIO PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS.

The Liberals of Ontario are already organizing for the provincial elections that must be held within the next year and that most likely will take place during next autumn. Ministers are making a tour of the province and are receiving cordial receptions wherever they appear. One of the strong candidates nominated by the party is Hon. S. C. Wood of Toronto, a veteran politician who is to run in West Victoria. Mr. Wood sat for that constituency for many years, and in the early confederation days was Mowatt's provincial treasurer. The Toronto Globe professes to be greatly pleased with the nomination of Mr. Wood, who it declares is an exceptionally strong and clear headed man. Premier Ross has shown ability of a high order in his position, and his friends claim that he will add another four years to the thirty, during which the Liberals of Ontario have had control of Ontario's government.

The chief commissioner of public works and the commissioner for agriculture were given a hearty reception by the people of Madawaska, and were able to rejoice with them at the great strides the county is making in agriculture. Everybody in and around Edmundston seems to have been present at the meeting which honored the ministers with an appreciative address, and in return was treated to good practical addresses by the visitors. Even Mr. Laforest, M. P. P., was present at the jubilation, but we trust that it is no indication that he is considering the question of resignation.

Lord Wantage whose death occurred in England Tuesday, was a special friend of the King and had a brilliant military career. He served in the Crimean campaign from 1854-5, part of the time being A. D. C. to the Commander-in-Chief, and received the Victoria Cross for deeds of valor at Alma and Inkerman. In the Prussian and Turco-Servian campaigns he did splendid work in connection with the English Red Cross Society detachments. Lord Wantage was an enthusiastic rifleman and hunter, and gave many valuable prizes for the encouragement of rifle shooting. He had no heir and the title dies with him.

When Mr. Pitt's transfers the force of his gigantic intellect from the consideration of the People's Gas Supply Company's interests and the compounding of Cook's remedies, to journalism, he betrays a lamentable misère of the enormous gifts with which he claims nature has endowed him. The generation of gas and the manufacture of patent medicine are industries that pay well tax Mr. Pitt's time and ability, and it is little wonder that his efforts at political writing, and the direction of a political party, are impotent and foolish.

The provincial prohibition act which came into force recently in P. E. Island, is causing considerable friction, and so far has failed to restrict the liquor traffic especially in Charlottetown where the saloons are openly violating the law. The Charlottetown city council has forbidden the policemen to enforce the law lest the city shall be saddled with the expense of any litigation that may follow in the effort of the anti-prohibitionists to test its constitutionality claiming that enforcement must be left to the government.

Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier are to visit P. E. Island during the present summer. They should also make a call on New Brunswick.

HEWITSON INQUEST.

Coroner's Jury Spent Four Hours in Deliberation

BEFORE AGREEING UPON A VERDICT.

The Hewitson enquiry was resumed at ten o'clock this morning and the evidence of J. W. Gerow was read over and signed by the witness. Coroner Seery then addressed the jury, reviewing the evidence and instructing them in their duties. He gave it as his opinion, based upon a personal examination of the body of the deceased, and also from the evidence adduced at the enquiry, that a post mortem examination was not necessary.

The jury retired shortly after eleven o'clock and after being out four hours returned the following as their unanimous verdict:

"That John Hewitson's death was caused by the excessive use of alcoholic liquors consumed on the premises of Newton Lee, and by culpable neglect on the part of the said Newton Lee in leaving him in a cold room and in not making more strenuous efforts to send him home at an earlier hour on Saturday, the 27th day of April last."
