NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences
Paraphrased for Herald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

J W Bell, Conservative M P, of Addington, Ont., is dead of paralysis.

A despatch from Paris states that Rev. Abbe Roy, of Memramcook College, N B, has been made an officer of the French Academy.

Quartermaster Sergt. Harrison of the Royal Artillery, Halifax dropped dead while crossing the barracks square Thursday evening.

Pierre Bergevin, who left Quebec 40 years ago, and has not communicated with his friends since, has returned home, having acquired a competency in San Francisco.

There are 43 men, women and children living in one seven-room house in Water street, Chatham. This is equal to the most congested tenement-house quarter of New York.

Sir Percy Girouard, K C M G, director of South African railways, has arrived at London, G B, from the Cape on business. He will return about September without visiting Canada.

The executive of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada in Hamilton, passed a resolution regretting that Dr Borden and the 48th Highlanders went on a Sunday excursion to the Buffalo Exhibition.

The Kings county Dominion election case is to come to trial at Hampton on Tuesday next, July 9. It is reported that an effort will be made to have the case postponed until October if the court will permit.

The Inland Revenue Department, Ottawa, received a letter Tuesday from A. McAllister, collector at Belleville, recommending an official for leave of absence. A few minutes later, a telegram was delivered at the Department, stating that McAllister had died at 2 a. m.

Premier Farquharson, of Prince Edward Island, while in Winnipeg Thursday on his way to the coast, was questioned regarding his political intention, and informed a reporter that he had decided to resign and contest the seat which will shortly be left vacant by Sir Louis Davies, Minister of Marine.

Forest fires are reported to be raging in several sections west of Summerside, P E I. In and around Richmond the forests have been laid waste near Coleman also. Even the fields of grain are yielding to the ravages of the fiery visitor, and it is feared that unless rain comes soon, the disaster will be appalling.

The residence of Judge Routhier, at St Irene, Charlevoix county, Quebec, was struck by lightning last Thursday, and the family had a miraculous escape. The roof was torn off and the lightning destroyed the lamp on the table near which Madame Routhier was sitting. The damage to the cottage amount to about \$1,200. Seven barns in the neighborhood were destroyed.

The new Northern Hotel at Millinocket, Maine, was destroyed by fire Wednesday night, and the guests and employees had exceedingly narrow escape from death in the flames. As it was, the occupants of the employees' quarters were cut off from escape by the regular passage ways and were obliged to make an exit through the windows. Three of the employees were seriously hurt, but it is not thought any of the injuries will prove fatal. The injured are: Ralph Washburn, clerk, head, arms and body severely burned; Frank Thompson, head waiter, leg broken; Nellie Roche, chambermaid, back injured. The property loss will reach nearly \$30,000, and only a small part of this amount is covered by insurance.

Thomas Powers, the proprietor of the Mansion Hotel, Hamilton, Ont., came near losing his life by accidentally locking himself in a big refrigerator in the cellar of his hotel. The refrigerator was a new one, holding nearly a ton of ice, and he went inside to see if the door fitted tightly. Thoughtlessly he pulled the door close after him, and a spring lock fastened it. He kicked on the door for a long time, but no one heard him. Finally he got an oak strip in front of the ice box

and pounded the door. He felt himself becoming weaker, but he renewed his efforts, and finally forced open the door, which is 14 inches thick. He fell in a faint and did not recover for several hours. He was in the refrigerator about 40 minutes.

It is said that Mr Courtney, Deputy Minister of Finance, will not be succeeded by Mr W D Ross, the new chief clerk of the department and late manager of the Bank of N S at Charlottetown, till the end of the calendar year. Mr Courtney, it is stated, will then be given an advisory seat on the treasury board, so that the Government will not lose his valuable services and long experience entirely.

ROBBED THE TRAIN

As In the Days of Old.

FUSILADE OF RIFLE BULLETS KEEPS PASSENGERS QUIET, \$40,000 TAKEN.

St Paul, July 5.—A despatch to the Associated Press from Havre, Montana, gives the following account of the Great Northern train robbery and the names of the persons shot by the robbers:

The injured—Gertrude M Smith, of Tomah, Wis., a passenger who leaped from a window, received bullet through right arm, but not seriously hurt; Mr Douglas, of Cancey, Mont, travelling auditor for the Montana division of the Great Northern, shot through left arm near shoulder; Brakeman Whiteside, of Havre, Mont., shot through right arm near shoulder, shattering bone; seriously injured.

As the Great Northern flyer train No. 3 was leaving Malta, Conductor Smith noticed what he supposed to be a tramp on the front end of the mail car, next to the engine. He tried to drive him off after the train started, but the man pulled a revolver and said he had better go back or he would shoot. The conductor returned to the coaches, and as Sheriff Griffith of Valley County was on the train arranged with him to arrest the man at the next siding. When the train approached Exeter, the next siding west of Malta, the conductor signalled the engineer to stop, but the train only slackened speed.

The conductor signalled a second time, but the train did not stop. Engineer Jones was, during this time, covered by a gun, and was told by the supposed tramp that if the train stopped he would kill him.

When the train reached a point three miles east of Wagner the engineer was forced to stop, and two more men appeared, armed with Winchester. The robbers commenced firing and the passengers at first thought children were celebrating the Fourth.

Brakeman Whiteside, of Havre, Mont., got off the rear end of the train and was shot through the right arm near the shoulder, shattering the bone.

Mr Douglas, of Cancey, Mont., auditor of the Great Northern Montana division, swung out on the steps on the south side of the car and was shot through the left arm near the shoulder, but received only a flesh wound.

Gertrude M. Smith, of Tomah, Wis., bound for Seattle, leaned out of a window and was shot in the right arm, but not seriously injured. Conductor Smith notified all passengers as fast as he could go through the train, to keep out of sight, which they did by getting down in the aisle of the cars.

A sheep herder riding by about a quarter of a mile from where the express car was blown up, was fired upon by the robbers. The bullet struck his saddle, but did not inflict any serious wounds. The sheep herder reported the robbery at Wagner Station about 3.35 and a posse of men from Malta, 12 miles from the scene of the robbery, and a posse of men from Glasgow, Mont., 75 miles east, started within 25 minutes by special train. A special train was also started from Havre with doctors to attend the wounded.

On the arrival of No. 3 at Wagner, Sheriff Griffith organized a posse of ten men and started on the trail of the robbers. After the robbers blew up the express car they started south for the Little Rockies. The reward is \$5,000, dead or alive, and it is said the robbers cannot possibly escape, as quick work was done in getting the best gun men in the country on their trail. The amount taken is said to be \$40,000.

DIED A HERO.

Trooper Boyd Perished
Helping Others.

RESCUED SIX WOMEN AND EIGHT CHILDREN FROM DROWNING.

Gave up His Life at Scene of Mohawk Accident.

South Framingham, Mass., July 5.—A letter has been received here from H. Hillmar, of Danbury, Conn., who was on the steamboat Mohawk, which struck a reef off Fort Slocom, N.Y., last Friday with 900 excursionists aboard, telling of the heroism displayed by Sergt. J. Andrew Boyd, of troop H, 6th cavalry, U.S.A., a former Saxonville young man, who lost his life in rescuing women and children.

Sergt Boyd was one of the first volunteers to get into the lifeboat, but so many crowded the boat that he abandoned her and took to the water, where women and children were struggling for help. Boyd succeeded in rescuing six women and eight children, and he was nearly exhausted. He was admonished to use more caution, but seeing three young women crying for help he again plunged into the water, catching hold of one of them. Telling the woman to put her hands around his neck, he struck out for a small boat close by. One of the other frantic women caught hold of the soldier's arm, and before he could extricate himself he was drawn under the water.

Rising to the surface he loosened the hold of one of the women and struck out again. He swam a few feet when two other women got a hold on his body. He was drawn under for the second time. He rose again, and a rowboat being near at hand he assisted two of the women into it, saving their lives. He caught hold of another young woman struggling in the water and started to swim to a boat, but the woman in her desperation got both hands around Boyd's neck, and he was unable in his exhausted condition to break her hold. Both sank and did not rise again.

Boyd saved more lives than anyone in the water, says Mr Hillman.
