

Canadian Butter in Cuba.

Cuba offers a profitable market for Canadian dairy products, and on this account the following incident is worthy of notice: Some time ago Pierre de Beaucourt of the Central Creamery, Scott Junction, Quebec, shipped some samples of butter to Havana. The collector at that port refused to accept the samples, on the ground that they contained oleomargarine, and justified himself by producing a chemist's certificate alleging that there was not less than 35 per cent. of this matter in the butter. The British Consul, however, obtained a sealed tin containing butter which had been condemned, and forwarded it to the Secretary of State at Ottawa. The butter was analyzed by Prof. Shutt, analyst at the Central Experimental Farm, when the following constituents were recorded: Fat, 83.13 per cent.; water, 10.70; salt, 4.02; curd by difference, 2.13. This shows that the butter was pure and entirely free from any foreign ingredient. It should be stated that the Havana collector has recommended the amendment of the existing law, so that all butter certified to by the official chemist of the country of exportation might be accepted. Such a regulation might be necessary in Canada, where the use of oleomargarine for purposes of adulteration is prohibited. It might, however, be applied to the United States, where the mixture of the substance with butter is permitted.

Start on Long Voyage in Canoe.

Capt. Voss, of Victoria, and Norman Luxton, a newspaper reporter, left Vancouver, B. C., the other morning in a 38-foot canoe to cross the Pacific Ocean. They expect to reach Sydney, Australia, about Christmas. The canoe is nearly five feet wide and decked in nearly the whole length. It has three masts. The two voyagers expect to do a good deal of hunting among the South Sea Islands to replenish their larder. They carry a sheet iron stove and complete cooking outfit, with coal as ballast. They will stop at Honolulu and New Guinea and other islands. They will stay at Sydney and Melbourne for several weeks and will then set sail for Delagoa Bay, in South Africa, where they will also spend some time. Then they will go to England, exhibit their strange war canoe and the trophies they will naturally gain in two years of travel, and then will return home.

The New Hunter.

Mr. Ernest Seton-Thompson, for many years Government Naturalist of Manitoba, and at present making an enviable reputation for himself on the lecture platform, recently gave his ideas of the new hunter. He is of the belief that a great change is coming over the feelings of the hunter, as is shown by the rapidly increasing number of wild animals in the Western States. Many old hunters, Mr. Seton-Thompson says, who once boasted of the large number of deer they could kill in a day, are now content to bring down one with a snapshot or flashlight. In a wonderfully graphic description of a moose hunt in which he participated, he said he thought when he gazed on the great animal, that the hunter, for the momentary pleasure, had in ten seconds made a heap of butcher meat of the giant of the forest which it had taken nature ten years to build. "And that," he said, "is your sport with the gun."

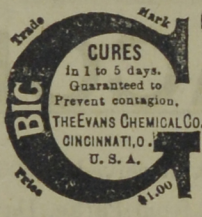
