

SERIOUS DAMAGE

To Railways by Yesterday's Storm.

C. P. R. EXPRESSES HELD UP ON HORT LINE.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Sherbrooke, Quebec, June 28.—A veritable cloud burst occurred in this vicinity last night and great damage was done. Several bridges on the C.P.R., the Maine Central and Quebec Central were washed away and half a dozen washouts occurred along the line.

At East Angus a dam broke, and one million feet of lumber was carried down the St. Francis river.

Samuel Willard's saw mill at Budswell was carried away and the owner's dead body was found in the meadow four miles distant this morning.

The Canadian Pacific expresses to and from Halifax were both held up and are likely not to be released before tomorrow morning.

Recent Deaths.

Mrs. Geo. C. Peters, wife of the N. B., Telephone Company's Manager at Moncton, and daughter of the late Judge Botsford died at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, Thursday evening, after undergoing an operation.

Joseph Cook, the noted author and lecturer who was once heard on the platform in Fredericton, is dead.

Senator Villeneuve, Conservative and an ex-Mayor of Montreal died in that city Thursday aged 65.

Andrew Allan, head of the Allan Steamship Company, and brother of the late Sir Hugh Allan, died at Montreal Thursday evening, aged 79.

The Boer War.

Who is He?

The telegram also stated that the deceased was reported to have a wife and two children. Sergt Phillips has thus far been unable to find any one who knows the man.

Trackmen's Strike.

The trackmaster of the C.P.R. sent a crew of men to Millville a few days ago to take the place of striking trackmen, but did not accomplish very much. A number of friends of the strikers ordered them to leave the place, and they acted upon the advice. A C.P.R. detective is at present making his headquarters in the city, and daily goes over the Fredericton branch railway.

Lord Minto's Visit

At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the committee appointed by the Mayor to arrange for a reception to the Governor-General, the Mayor was appointed a committee to wait upon the local government and ascertain what steps they purpose to take in regard to the matter. It is felt by the committee that the government should co-operate with the council in welcoming their Excellencies to the city.

A Big Move

Leonard Grace has purchased the O'Leary lot on Needham street, and has moved therto the house on Charlotte street, formerly owned by his father, the late Henry Grace. The job of moving the building was executed by Emery Scott of Douglas, an expert in that line of work. The transfer was made by way of Regent street, a distance of about two blocks.

CHANGES IN THE MAP.

How They Have Puzzled Old Time Students of Geography.

Why, where is Patagonia? was the astonishing query recently put to me by an old schoolmate, as, carelessly turning the leaves of his little son's geography, he suddenly came upon a recent map of South America. The boundaries which we boys had once regarded as immutable have changed, and the map which the vivid impression of youth had engraved firmly upon our memory was no longer in existence. The experience of my friend, a man of considerable intelligence, is not an isolated instance. The rapidity of our geographical progress within the last decades has rendered it extremely difficult for the layman to follow the course of events.

In 1825 three great continents were practically unexplored. Australia, or New Holland, as it was then called, was nothing more than a terra incognita—a mere geographical idea; the vast expanse of Africa, with the exception of the Mediterranean region and the little settlement at the Cape, was still the land of wonder and conjecture and as it had been in the days of the Romans, while central Asia, with its millions of inhabitants, was effectively closed to Europeans. In the south nature had reared her mighty barrier, the Himalayas, and in the east we find China immured, both in a literal and figurative sense, within that gigantic wall of exclusiveness which seemed designed to screen forever from the prying gaze of the civilized world the sacred and inviolable "empire of the sun."

Yet it is upon the American continent that the most marvelous changes have been wrought—changes whose magnitude we, the living witnesses, can scarcely appreciate. As the rising flood imperceptibly, but steadily, advances the water line, thus constantly altering the contour of the beach, so the swelling tide of population, surging westward, has through this entire century surely, but incessantly, pushed forward that long western boundary line of 1,600 miles, the outlines of which have never for a moment remained the same.—Scribner's Magazine.

Finding Distant Thunderstorms.

An instrument to which considerable interest attaches has been devised and described by M. T. Tommasina. Its object is to detect distant thunderstorms. The apparatus consists essentially of a self decohering carbon coherer placed in circuit with a dry cell and an ordinary telephone receiver. The grains of carbon are hermetically sealed in a glass tube attached to a telephone magnet so as to lie horizontally when the receiver is placed to the ear. The impression produced upon the observer is that of being transported into the neighborhood of the thunderstorm, which might yet be hidden below the horizon. To strengthen the effect the author used three copper "antennae," each 30 m. long. In this manner it was found possible to observe the development of a violent thunderstorm at a distance 12 hours before it broke loose at the observing station, which was situated on the Lago Maggiore. A distant rain is indicated by a rattling sound before a cloud is visible.—London Engineer.
