

IRISH LEADERS TO TAKE UP ARMS

Only Need Arms and Training of Boers to Testify Their Hatred of England.

Dublin, Oct. 2.—At a meeting yesterday of the Irish League a letter from Mr. William O'Brien, M. P., was read, expressing the hope that if the English King carried out his threatened visit to Ireland in 1902, the League would succeed in arousing such a spirit as would convince His Majesty that he comes among a people discontented and disaffected to the core, who only need the arms and the training of the Boers to testify their hatred of English rule with an eloquence equal to that of the South Africa Republics.

Mr. John Redmond, M. P., leader of the Parnellite Nationalists, in the course of a speech, said that the Irish were always prepared to take up arms to effect the freedom of Ireland, but were not strong enough.

Mr. John Dillon, M. P., also attended the meeting.

The president expects that at the beginning of the term the attendance will number about 140, with a probable increase later on. The formal opening will be held on Friday, Oct. 11, when Dr. Tufts will deliver an address on King Alfred and His Times.

Meaning of "Pin Money."

"Pin money" now means the allowance of money for a woman's own personal expenditure, but originally meant literally the actual sum spent on pins.

So extremely important was this yearly purchase that apparently a special sum of money was obtained from all indulgent husbands for it, and at a later time, when the pins became cheap and common, woman-kind gradually came to spend their allowance on other vanities, but the old name, "pin money," remained in use.

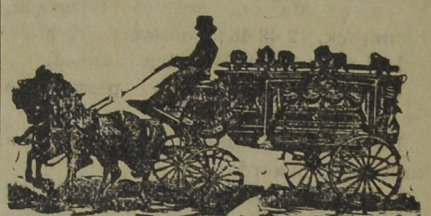
