EXHIBITORS NOW FILLING UP BOOTHS.

The Official Program for The Exhibition.

LIST OF GENTLEMEN WHO WILL ACT AS EXPERT JUDGES.

The provincial exhibition to be held in this city next week, will be formally opened on Tuesday at nine o'clock, and will close on the night of the following Friday. At 1.30 p.m. on Tuesday there will be a grand parade of Prof. Leon's educated ponies, accompanied by Bryson's band, from the parliament buildings to the show grounds. At two o'clock the exhibition will be formally opened by His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor.

From 2.30 to 3 o'clock p.m., there will be an exhibition of physical drill and bayonet exercise by a detachment of men from the R. C. R. I.

At three o'clock the grand performance by Prof. Leon's ponies and Prof. Hampton's dog circus will commence in the amusement tent. A similar programme to the above will be carried out on each of the three following days, and there will be a band concert each afternoon and evening.

On Thursday evening of exhibition week there is to be a grand display of fireworks on the grounds, and a parade by the members of the Fredericton fire department. The firemen will muster on parliament square at 7 o'clock, and march to the exhibition grounds by way of Queen street. The fireworks will be set off under the direction of Chief Engineer Lipsett.

The general admission fee to the exhibition grounds will be 25 cents and for children 15 cents. The admission fee to the amusement tent will be, adults 25 cents, children, 15 cents. Tickets may be obtained at hotels and drug stores and on the grounds.

SENSATIONS IN COURT.

A Couple of Them Sprung in St. John Before Judge Gregory.

A sensation was sprung in the Circuit court at St. John Thursday morning, says the Globe, in the suit of Dr. Morrison vs. the Street Railway Company.

At the opening of the court Mr. Pugsley rose and said his attention had been called to a most flagrant attempt to interfere with the course of justice. From his information it appeared that James Crawford, of the North End, professing

to act for Dr. Morrison, approached Conductor Whittaker of the street railway and sought to induce him to go to New York to obtain a situation. Letters from New York offering him the situation had since been received. The second matter is that the day before yesterday the defendant company subpoenaed Miss Brownell, formerly Dr. Morrison's bookkeeper. The doctor's brother, Frederick Morrison, tried to induce her to leave the province, gave her twenty dollars, and she was informed that her present situation in the Pure Milk Company would be held open for her. She went to J R Currie, of the business college, for advice. He told her not to go. His brother, J S Currie, coming in after she had left, informed of what had occurred, went to the train and told Miss Brownell she must not go, and accompanied her home. Dr Morrison's brother was with her at the depot.

Mr Justice Gregory ordered that Jas. Crawford and Frederick Morrison attend the court on Monday at ten o'clock to answer certain charges of contempt, and to shew cause why they should not be punished on information to be filed by the Attorney General.

Later in the day, says the Sun, Mr Hazen requested that the case be adjourned on account of the serious illness of the plaintiff. He stated that Dr Inches had been called in that morning to attend Dr Morrison and found him very ill. Visiting him again in the afternoon he found his patient unconscious, and methods of artificial respiration had been resorted to. Dr Morrison during the trial had been under a great strain, which had proved too much for his weakened health. Dr Inches considered Dr Morrison to be in a very dangerous condition. Mr Hazen asked that the court adjourn until Friday morning.

Dr Pugsley expressed his deep regret at the plaintiff's illness and his willingness to accede to any suggestion made by his counsel. But he thought that, as in view of Dr. Morrison's serious condition, he would surely be unable to attend the next day, the case should be still further postponed. The court agreed to adjourn until Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

At an early hour this morning Dr. Morrison was still unconscious and in a dangerous condition, and his physicians were unable to state anything regarding the outcome.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Cape Town, Sept. 13.—While Colonel Munro's column was returning from Barkly East to Dordrecht it was attacked by the Boers under Commandants Fouche Miburgh in Wolwe Kloof. The advance guard was well in the pass when a terrific fire was opened upon them from the heights above the kloof. The British were in a precarious position on the flat, where there was little or no cover, but they rapidly unlimbered and returned a brisk fire. The fighting continued for some time. The British had four wounded. It is reported that the Boers had four killed and a considerable number wounded.

The Dordrecht Volunteers surprised a party of Boers near a farm house and ordered them to surrender. The Boers refused and the British opened fire, wounding General Smuts and another Boer and killing Captain Arbendorff. General Smuts succeeded in making his escape.

Matjesfontein, Cape Colony, Sept 12.—Colonel Crabbe has surprised the camp of Van Der Merwe, the most trusted lieutenant of Commandant Scheeper, killed him and another Boer and made prisoners of 37 out of 100 men under Van Der Merwe's command.

—TO—

Water Consumers.

The attention of water consumers is called to section 12 of the Water Bye Laws as follows:

12. Persons removing from any premises who have paid full rates in advance, will be entitled to an allowance for the time unexpired, provided written notice is given at the Superintendent's Office at the time of such removal.

Persons wishing to discontinue the use of water must give written notice thereof at the Office previous to the expiration of the time for which payment has been made, otherwise they will be liable for the rent for the ensuing six months.

Owing to the increasing tendency of water consumers to ignore the above Bye Law, it will be strictly enforced in future.

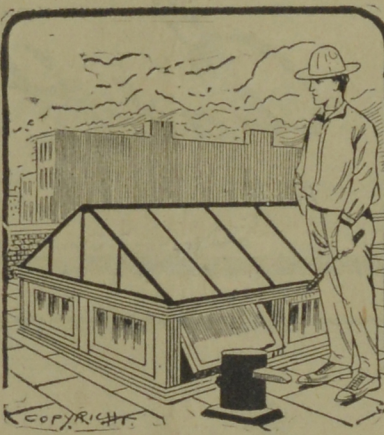
