Men for the Woods.

Fred A. Estey is to leave on Monday morning for the Tobique with a large crew of men to start operations in the lumber woods.

The Skating Rink.

A meeting of the directors of the Fredericton skating rink Company is to be held at the office of W T Whitehead this evening at 7.30 o'clock. A full attendance is requested.

Police Court.

An assault case in which two downtown residents were interested, was to have come before the police court this morning, but a settlement being arrived at, it was withdrawn.

A Cheap Rate.

The Star Line steamship company will issue return tickets from St. John to Fredericton during the exhibition at the exceedingly low rate of fifty cents. No doubt the capacity of the company's splendid steamers will be taxed to their fullest capacity.

The River.

The water has risen a few inches here as a result of the late rain storm, and a further rise is looked for. The ebb and flow of the tide during the last ten days has averaged about a foot, and it is claimed that last night there was a tidal rise of eighteen inches.

Christian Endeavor.

Rev. C. E. Eberman, Christain Endeavor National Field Secretary, will be in Fredericton on Sept. 27. A mass meeting will be held in the evening of that day, addressed by him. Mrs. Eberman, who is an energetic junior worker, will accompany her husband.

A Missionary to Wed.

The marriage will take place on Sept. 17, of Rev Alexander F Robb, late of Doaktown, and Miss Bessie Arnot Cummings, daughter of Rev Robert Cumming of Westville, N. S. Mr and Mrs Robb will leave for Korea, where they will take up Presbyterian mission work.

The Dredging Operations.

The clamshell dredge has completed a twelve foot channel from the head of the city hall wharf to the draw of the railway bridge, and is now dredging out near the face of the Normal school wharf. She will finish the work probably today or tomorrow, and will then be removed to the city wharf below the highway bridge.

The Game Season.

The close season for partridges and big game expires on Saturday, and no doubt our local sportsmen will be heard from early next week. The past season is said to have been a favorable one for partridges owing to the continued dry weather. Deer are also reported to be plentiful in the vicinity of the city, and no doubt fresh venison will be on the market next week.

To Curtail His Operations.

John Kilburn, the well known lumberman, who operates in the province of Quebec, has decided to curtail his operations somewhat during the coming season. He cut about twelve million feet last season, the bulk of which is still scattered along the river between Woodstock and the Big Rapids. He does not expect to cut more than six million feet during the coming winter. Mr. Kilburn operates on the northwestern branches of the St. John, and always experiences more or less difficulty in getting his lumber out of the brooks. With a smaller cut he thinks that the trouble will be abated to a considerable extent.

The Tartars Won.

The Young Tartars succeeded in turning the tables on the St John Clippers in the base ball match at Scully's grove yesterday, defeating them by one run. The score at the close of the game stood twelve to eleven in favor of the home team. The Clippers scored one run in the first inning, nine in the third and one in the ninth. By the end of the seventh inning the Tartars had succeeded in tying the score and two more runs put on in the eighth inning gave them the game with an inning to spare. The game was an improvement on the one of the previous day and the attendance was

larger. Walker and Lister composed the battery for the Tartars. The Clippers returned home last evening.

STILL HUNG UP.

City Clerk Beckwith Defies the Council to Eject Him.

The situation at the city clerk's office remains practically unchanged. Mr Beckwith is still in possession of the private office and not only refuses to move out but defies any member of the council to forcibly eject him. He maintains that he has a right to the office until the first day of May, when his appointment expires and threatens to take legal proceedings against any individual who attempts to remove him or his belongings during the interim. His position is rather an extreme one but he claims to have the law on his side, and says he is preferred to assume all responsibility for his actions.

At one o'clock today Ald Everett, who is acting as chairman of the city hall committee pro tem, appeared at the clerk's office, accompanied by a carpenter named Underhill, and found Mr Beckwith sitting in the open office ready for just such callers. He had his private office locked up tight and refused to open the door for the alderman. The latter requested a private interview and the clerk retired with him to the assessors' office, where they remained closeted for nearly half an hour. The carpenter was left standing in the clerk's office, and becoming weary of the job picked up his tools and bolted for home before Ald Everett and the clerk returned.

At the conclusion of the conference the clerk locked his office and went to dinner, and Ald Everett also departed.

The city clerk in reply to a question, stated that he had refused to budge an inch from the stand he had taken.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Local Committees Completing Arrangements for the Provincial Gathering.

The executive of the City Sunday School Association together with the Fredericton members of the York County Executive met last evening in the Y M C A parlor, having with them Rev A Lucas, Field Secretary, and formed a local arrangement committee for the Provincial Sunday School Convention to be held in the Methodist church on Oct 8th, 9th and 10th.

This committee will ask the pastors to make announcements next Sunday and appoint two persons from each school to co-operate as a billeting committee, and meet again in same place on Monday evening next at 7.30. By invitation of this committee the Field Secretary, Rev. A. Lucas, was present with them. Mayor Crockett will deliver an address of welcome on afternoon of Oct. 8th.

This committee is sending letters to all pastors and superintendents in York asking their co-operation in gleaming from this convention all possible benefit for Sunday schools of York county. Each school may send two delegates, pastors are members in their own right. All names are to be sent to Mr A S McFarlane, secretary, before Oct 1st.

All teachers of local schools will register as delegates. The two from other schools will be entertained. Further information will be given in these columns.

A BAD SPILL.
