

## DUKE AND DUCHESS.

Given a Great Ovation on Reaching Winnipeg.

### SALUTE OF NINETEEN GUNS

And an Enormous Throng at the Depot.

TESTIFIED TO ENTHUSIASM OF THE ROYAL RECEPTION.

Presentation to the Duke.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Lennie Manitoba, Sept. 26.—The royal train is now in Manitoba and the people of the West are giving their Royal Highnesses a typically western and unquestionably royal reception. It has been the same all along the line.

At Schreiber the royal train stopped ten minutes and the whole population turned out to give them a rousing reception. The children who were massed on the platform, sang The Maple Leaf, and cheered the King and the Royal visitors.

A pretty child of six years, Miss Kathleen Walker, who was beautifully gowned in white, presented the Duchess with a handsome bouquet, and the Duchess received her kindly and showed her over the royal car.

This was by all odds the prettiest reception of the day.

Winnipeg, Sept. 26.—The arrival of the royal train at 11.30, promptly on time, was greeted by a salute of 19 guns.

There was an immense crowd at the station, and Their Royal Highnesses received an ovation.

The civic address was read at the city hall after the procession, and His Royal Highness presented medals to South African veterans.

Lt. Col. Roy on behalf of the citizens, presented His Royal Highness with a handsome leather case filled with a collection of choice mineralogical specimens.

The royal party leave for the west at midnight.

Montreal, Sept. 26.—A letter has been received by the National Council of Women, dated Ottawa, Sept. 23, and signed "Victoria Mary," expressing her gratitude to the women from all parts of this vast country who have asserted themselves with the token of good will toward herself and husband, and stating that the objects of the society have her deepest sympathy.

Her Royal Highness concludes, "I pray that its work may be crowned with all possible success."

Fort William, Ont., Sept. 26.—The special trains bearing the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and their travelling companions westward to British Columbia spent yesterday on the rugged north shore of Lake Superior and by night had put Fort William and the lake behind them and were speeding on towards Manitoba.

The day's run was for the most part through long stretches of unsettled country, but at all the widely separated towns and villages the people gathered to offer their cheers and welcome to the royal party. There were lumbermen, hunters and miners and some Indians in the little crowds and the welcome was always a hearty one. The railway stations were all decorated, and each little settlement had a display of flags and bunting.

The first crowd was gathered at Chapleau, which was passed at daylight and, far to the westward after night had come, the people were still gathered about the stations as the trains swept past.

The Royal train stopped for an hour at Bolkow to allow the party to dress and the duke left his car for a brisk walk. Both the duke and duchess took a lively interest in the country through which they passed and greatly enjoyed the wild rugged scenery. They were particularly interested in the 60 mile run along the ledges and promontories on the Lake Shore from Heron Bay to Jackfish Bay. The lake was constantly in sight and the views along the rock-rimmed coast were a succession of impressive pictures.

The earlier hours of the day were bright but in mid-afternoon it began raining and the temperature fell to chilliness.

The Duke and Duchess will reach Winnipeg at noon today. An alteration in plans which will extend their stay was made yesterday. They had intended to leave there late this afternoon, but have now decided to remain for dinner at Government House, and will not resume their journey until late tonight.

### A MONCTON MAN

Arrested on Charge of Murder Committed at Glace Bay, C. B.

Moncton, Sept. 26.—Edward Wallace, better known here as "Cook" Wallace, was arrested here last night on the strength of a telegram from D. A. Hearn, crown prosecutor of Glace Bay, asking for the apprehension of Wallace on the charge of murder. The prisoner is being held pending the arrival of an officer from Glace Bay, where Wallace is wanted in connection with the death of Taddy Poirier, who came to an untimely end in rather a mysterious manner last Saturday night. Wallace denies knowing Poirier or anything about his death beyond reading of the affair in the papers before leaving Glace Bay. He says he was running as conductor on the Lousburg railway and drew his pay Saturday morning last, starting for his home in Moncton Monday morning. Wallace is 38 years of age and has a wife and one child living here. He is the son of Henry Wallace, of the I. C. R., and is a native of Moncton. When taken into custody last night he told the officers that he had his trunk packed and intended returning to Glace Bay at 3 o'clock this morning. He appeared surprised when told that he was wanted in Glace Bay in connection with Poirier's death and says that he neither has any knowledge of the affair or that he hurried away from the town.

### American Athletes Won.

New York, Sept. 26.—The athletes of Yale and Harvard met the athletic representatives of Oxford and Cambridge Universities yesterday at Berkeley Oval in track and field events, and, as was expected, the American collegians proved to be too much for the visitors, the Americans winning six out of the nine events. Points were counted for wins only, so that the Harvard and Yale men defeated their English opponents by a score of 6 points to 3.

Between the American universities, honors were equally divided. The Oxford representatives failed to gain a point, Cambridge being in front in all three contests which were won by the Englishmen.

### Robbery at Dorchester.

Dorchester, N. B., Sept. 26.—The store of Scott H. Dickie situated about a mile from Dorchester Corner, was broken into Tuesday and \$300 worth of clothing and smaller articles were taken, which will probably bring the total up to near \$500. Entrance was effected through a second storey window, and the plunder was carried away in two wagons. The thieves also, while in the store, made a meal of canned goods and biscuits. An ex-convict named John Doyle has been arrested for complicity in the affair and is now in jail. Detectives Bowser and Ayer are now after two more convicts named Nickerson and Doyle, who have decamped.

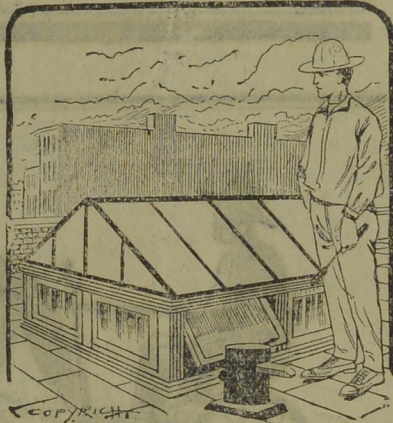
