

FOUND HIS WIFE.

Patrick Donahoe and Jas. Haney Formerly of this City

LOCKED UP AT OLDTOWN MAINE, LATTER CHARGED WITH ADULTERY.

Found to be Living With Donahoe's Wife.

WHO TELLS HER STORY TO THE JUDGE.

(Bangor Daily News, Saturday)

"Ah-ha! I've found ye at last—curse ye!"

It was a man, blear-eyed, dusty and unkempt, who stood up on the rear platform of an Oldtown-bound electric and shook his fist at what appeared to the startled passengers in the passing as a pretty pastoral scene. There was a neat dwelling with the head of the house seated upon the stoop calmly smoking his pipe, as he gazed at the sunset in apparent peace with all the world. Near him was a comely woman, rocking while a little child played at their feet and through the open door could be seen a cradle.

The man on the car made no explanations but settled back in a seat muttering curses, long and deep, under his breath.

For more than two years Patrick Donahoe of Fredericton, N. B., has been searching for his wife and the man who has ruined his home. He had found both.

Friday morning he went to Judge Whiting of Oldtown and unfolded a sorrowful tale. He said that he once had a wife and five children and had lived happily for some years in Fredericton. Hard times came on and he obtained work and moved his family to Vanceboro where they set up housekeeping, he providing for them as best he could. After a time he was out of work at Vanceboro and leaving, as he says, his family well provided with groceries and \$1.25 in money, he started on foot for Houlton to look for work. He obtained employment in a mill there and was doing well, when he learned that his wife had sent four of the children back to Fredericton as parish charges, and had taken the baby and gone to Bangor, where she had been seen in company with one James Haney, formerly of Fredericton, and an old acquaintance of them both.

Since then he has been on the track of the guilty pair and he found them almost by accident, for the next time he saw his wife was at the little house by the Stillwater switch where his suspicions were fully realized. She was living with Haney as his wife, and there was another child, an infant, which could not be legitimate. He did not want his wife back again. He did not want to punish her even, but he wanted vengeance on the destroyer of his home.

Judge Whiting issued a warrant against Haney for adultery, he was arrested by City Marshal Gates and brought to Oldtown, given a brief examination and bound over in the sum of \$1000 for the next term of court.

The Wife's Story.

But as in most cases there is another side of the story. The wife's tale is a touching one. It may be true or not, but to an entirely disinterested party noting the appearance of both husband and wife, her's is entitled to at least equal weight.

She says that when her husband left her to go to Houlton, it was with threats and blows; that there was not a mouthful to eat in the house or a bit of fuel; that she was practically deserted. She found kind friends who helped her to send her children back to Fredericton, where she knew they would be cared for and then with her youngest which must have a mother's care, she came to Bangor. She sought in vain for work and was almost in despair, when she happened to meet James Haney whom she had known in Fredericton. Haney was well supplied with money having just come off the drive.

He bought her food and clothing and in short took care of her and her child and has been doing so ever since. About a year ago Haney secured employment in the mill at Stillwater. They moved into the small house on the Stillwater road and have been living comfortably and happily as man and wife.

Yes, there had been a child born. She did not, could not deny the fact. She might be guilty in the eyes of the law and disgraced before all people, but better this in comfort and peace than the old

life of poverty and wretchedness, she thought.

Donahoe gloated in triumph over the downfall of his bitter enemy, but his triumph was short lived as Judge Whiting ordered him to give bonds in \$200, for his appearance as a witness. This somewhat staggered Patrick and so it was that all Friday afternoon and night the two men occupied adjacent cells in the police station and held a long and fervid cursing match punctuated by the snores of old John Pons, who occupied the cell between them.

Haney being a steady and competent workman, the chances are that he will be able to get bonds, while the wronged husband is not so fortunate and will probably be obliged to remain in the Bangor jail until August.

[All the parties are well known in Fredericton. Haney served a term in Dorchester penitentiary for theft. Donahoe formerly lived in the Scotch barracks and was a laborer.]

Lost in Collision.

The Norwegian barque Elise, Captain March, from Moss, in Christiania Fjord April 1 for New York, in ballast, probably was sunk and 14 men lost last Thursday night south of Cape Sable by collision with the Wilson line steamer Ohio, which arrived Sunday at Boston from Hull, Eng. The steamer was uninjured.

The barque suddenly appeared in the fog, sailing on the wind, and struck the steamer on the bow and, after stopping momentarily, drifted astern. Captain Hadaway watched her until she disappeared in the fog without an outcry. Apparently she was not seriously injured. A vessel's boat with a young sailor in it was picked up. He could give only little information intelligibly, except that 14 men were lost.
